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KNOCKDOWN WINS, STAR PILOT NEXT, AT SANTA ANITA

Arcadia, Cal., Feb. 23—(U.P.)—Knockdown, Elizabeth Arden's bargain colt, won the ninth running of the \$100,000 Santa Anita derby today with his stablemate, Star Pilot, running second.
Louis B. Mayer's fast-stepping filly, Honeymoon, finished third in the five-horse race before 65,000 race-mad fans.
The Discovery colt, purchased as a two-year-old by the Maine Chance farm for \$2,000, broke out in front and was never seriously threatened.
Fred Wyse's Air Rate made a brief bid in the backstretch, but could not keep up with the sizzling pace set by Knockdown and faded when the real running began in the stretch. Time for the mile and one-eighth was 1:50.3-5.
The Maine Chance entry paid \$3.00 to win and \$2.50 to place, with no show betting because of the small field.
At the wire Knockdown, ridden by Jockey Bobby Permaine, was two lengths in front of his stablemate, while Star Pilot was another three and a half lengths in front of Honeymoon, with Favorite fourth and Air Rate fifth.

HOGAN AHEAD IN PENSACOLA PLAY
Pensacola, Fla., Feb. 23—(U.P.)—Ben Hogan, the Hershey, Pa., golfing master, fired a four-under-par 68 today to retain his lead in the \$7500 Pensacola open golf tournament with a 54-hole total of 203.

BARTOLO CLAIMS HE'S SICK; CANCEL FIGHT WITH PEP

New York, Feb. 23—(U.P.)—A claim of illness by Sal Bartolo caused cancellation today of next Friday night's featherweight "little-clarity" bout with Willie Pep, despite the statement of a New York boxing commission physician that he could find nothing wrong with Bartolo.
Bartolo, who is recognized as the National Boxing Association champion, will be asked to appear before New York Commissioner Eddie Egan for questioning some time next week.
A substitute bout of 10 rounds was arranged in place of the 15-round title bout. Little known Jimmy McAllister, a Baltimore Negro, will meet Pep, Hartford fighter who holds the New York and affiliated states version of the crown.
Bartolo said he suffered a "spell of sneezing and chills" while sparring at Stillman's gymnasium last Wednesday. He remained in bed Thursday and Friday after taking penicillin treatments.
When Dr. William Walker advised that he saw no evidence of anything wrong with the champion, Bartolo replied that the treatment and his confinement in bed had weakened him.
