Ballet Program To Be Presented For Association

Alicia Markova, who has been called "greater than Pavlova" and "the greatest classic

ballerina in history" by critics, with her partner, Anton Dolin, will present a program of classic and romantic ballets for the Jackson County Civic Music association Monday evening at the high school auditorium in Medford. This is the third attraction of the 1945-46 concert season.

Markova and Dolin, with their ensemble, will present their program in three groups. First will be "Suite de Danse" based on seven Chopin compositions and the second will be a "Suite of Romantic Dances". The last group will feature famous dances from "The Nutcracker" by Peter Ilyich Tchaikovsky.

Both Miss Markova and Mr. Dolin are English born. Miss Markova (Lillian Alice Marks) learned ballet in an English suburb under the famous Serge Diaghilev and was taken into his company at the age of 14.

Born Patrick Healy-Kay in Sussex, England, Dolin was also Russianized out of his British christening by the great Diaghilev, in whose company he made his debut. Dolin danced in England, France and other continental countries before coming to America in 1929. He was the only non-Russian to hold the exalted post of premiere danseur with the Diaghilev company and for many years made national tours as first dancer for the Ballet Theater of New York.

Markova, who toured the British Isles with Dolin after

the break-up of Diaghilev's company, broke tradition in 1938 by becoming the first non-Russian prima ballerina of a Russian ballet company, with Leonide Massine's Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo.

The program is set for 8:15 p.m.

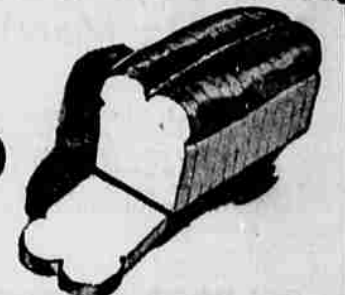
Dale Ward—Accordianist
