

POSTER CONTEST ENTRIES INVITED BY C. E. MONITOR

Valley youth are being urged this week to enter a poster contest being sponsored by the Christian Science Monitor which has as its purpose and theme "what youth can do to make the United Nations Organization succeed." A window giving information on the contest has been set up at the Junior Red Cross headquarters in the Holly building.

Under the contest rules, the sum of \$100 will be paid for the best poster received from a high school student and an equal sum for the best received from a student attending either an art school, a trade school or college. For the second best poster, at either level, \$25 will be paid and 20 certificates of merit will also be awarded.

All posters must reach the Magazine Editor of the Christian Science Monitor, Boston, by April 6, 1946. They may be done in black and another color. Preferably they should be horizontal in shape and should not measure more than 30 inches wide and 24 inches deep, the rules state. Each poster must be accompanied by a form being printed in current issues of the Monitor.

The Monitor will judge all posters from the basis of their artistic merit and their visual presentation of UNO's meaning for

youth, it is stated. According to the editors of the Monitor, the contest was started "because the Monitor knows the UNO needs youth backing and believes that youth of the land will welcome an opportunity to dramatize their stake in lasting peace."

ALUMINUM BOAT DISPLAYED HERE

Now being shown in Medford at the Medford Garage, local Hudson agent, is an all-aluminum boat, manufactured by the Oak Street Tank Works in Ashland. Designed with air spaces at either end, the boat cannot be capsized even when filled with water, according to Ralph Furrer, dealer.

The boat is suitable for four occupants, and is propelled by motor or oars. Measuring 12 feet in length, it weighs but 130 pounds, and welded seams prevent leakage.

First manufactured three years ago at the Tank Works by Harry Morris, the boat has been used on lakes and rivers in this area and near Klamath Falls. Production was halted during the war by lack of materials. Furrer states that he is now taking orders for boats to be delivered before the fishing season opens.

Ice Anesthesia Is Gaining Favor At Research Hospital

Minneapolis (U.P.)—Dr. Clarence Dennis, associate professor of surgery at the University of Minnesota, says research at the University hospitals has revealed that patients frequently prefer ice anesthesia to other forms. Dr. Dennis addressed physicians from many parts of the United States who have been attending a clinic on anesthesiology at the Center for Continuation Study at the University.

"Wide interest has been expressed in the possibilities of amputation of extremities where the only anesthesia used was refrigeration," Dr. Dennis said.

"Patients who have had one extremity removed in this manner and the other by means of another method of anesthesia all express their preference for refrigeration."
