

Rapid Antedate Of Weapons of War Is Seen By Professor

Berkeley, Cal. (U.P.) — A recently released captain of the Naval Reserve, who has returned to his science laboratory, says that military strategists cannot map the security of the nation for more than five years in advance.

The scientist, Dr. Leonard B. Loeb, professor of physics on the Berkeley campus of University of California who was assigned to Naval scientific research during hostilities, foresees possible new inventions which will antedate all present weapons.

Professor Loeb, writing in a Naval ordinance laboratory publication, says that the five-year estimate may be too long, but "it certainly is not too short."

"It is possible that a new fundamental discovery might lead to devices materially altering strategy and tactics, which reach fruition in less than five years," Professor Loeb stated.

"For example, devices called radar and derived from the development of the powerful high-frequency oscillators needed in the studies of nuclear reactions were initiated in the early 1930's," he explained.

"It is possible, that other devices might mature more quickly," he warned.

France Appeals To Americans to Hike Penicillin Quotas

Paris (U.P.)—France has appealed to America to increase its penicillin allotment to 50 billion units of penicillin a month according to Health Ministry officials.

"This is the absolute minimum," he said. "Actually we need between 100 and 150 billion units."

France currently receives an average of nine billion units monthly from America, and was promised 30 billion for January. The distribution of the drug is strictly controlled in 29 centers in Paris and 109 in the provinces. Only the severest cases are treated. So valuable is penicillin here that its black market price is 30,000 francs, or \$240 an ampoule.

Since liberation France has produced only five million units. According to the Health Ministry, factory owners here are reluctant to invest in the necessary machinery for fear that new discoveries in making penicillin will render their outlay fruitless.

Famous Dancers Present Classic Ballet Program

(By Mrs. E. E. Gore) With a meticulously selected group of stars and soloists from their large company of ballet dancers, Alicia Markova and Anton Dolin, two of the greatest exponents of classic ballet on the boards today, brought to Medford last night under the management of Civic Concert Service, Inc., an unprecedented extravaganza of classic dancing art.

Classic and romantic gems from famous ballets were presented, featuring these two great artists and Ana Ricardo and Albia Kavan. The larger organization has been touring the country appearing in the great centers of musical and artistic culture, with elaborate scenery, stage sets and symphony orchestra, but this smaller group, though preserving the highest tradition of ballet dancing, is adapted to successful presentation in small cities where large auditoriums and elaborate staging are impracticable.

Art Impresses Though there were plenty of patrons in the audience that filled the auditorium who understood in a non-professional way the varied beauty and intricacies of the adagio, arabesque, demille, port de bras, batterie, pointes and the mechanical pattern of the ballet, people in general were less concerned with the exquisite details of perfect technique than they were in line, color and beauty of the dance as seen in front of a simple backdrop with artistic and adequate lighting effects.

Dancing as a medium of emotional self-expression is a very ancient art, used alike by peasants and kings, but the perfection of detail demanded by classic ballet dates back a hundred years or more and is not to be attained except by deep study, constant practice and the promotion of an ideal through imagination and the blending of knowledge of the related arts—painting, drama and music.

In Three Parts The program last night was in three parts, the first of which was inspired by the magical beauty of the music of Chopin and contained seven numbers. These were illuminated for the spectator by the fact that most of the melodies were familiar and long cherished classics, thus the eye was free to see and the mind was focused on the technique which produced interpretation in bodily grace and movement.

The second group was a suite of romantic dances which included "Vestris Solo," a vehicle for the strength, power and artis-

try of Anton Dolin and the "Pas de Quatre" by Alicia Markova, Jean Engel, Albia Kavan and Ana Ricardo. Inspired by four great dancers of the nineteenth century and possessing, in addition to all the requirements of ballet, an amusing anecdote of historic significance, this number, and also "The Polka," featuring in addition Jack Ganswer, were favorites with the audience.

The third group was famous dances from "The Nutcracker Suite" by Tchaikowsky. To the ensemble were added Fay Rachel and Jack Cooper. Each number was received with mounting enthusiasm, climaxed in the haunting rhythm of the "Waltz of the Flowers," given in ultra-classic form by the soloist and ensemble.

The interpretive work of the orchestra was much appreciated and was characterized by delightful two-piano excerpts.

Next concert of this series is Selma Kaye, dramatic soprano, who will appear Monday, March 11.
