

HAL CARVER TO REOPEN CAMERA SHOP THURSDAY

After three years in the navy, Hal Carver has returned to Medford to reopen Hal's Camera Shop at 229 East Main street. The store will open Thursday, according to Carver.

The interior of the store will be modern in design and the photo finishing department has been streamlined to give the best possible service, Carver said. A projection room for showing of personal movies and slides will be available to the public.

Carver enlisted in the Seabees as a photographer's mate, first class, in July, 1942. His duties with the 55th Naval Construction Battalion took him to various parts of the South Pacific. Carver photographed many naval installations and activities which were put in book form as a record of the battalion.

Medford was well represented in the battalion, including Marmie Olson, Connie Latham, Ed Hansen, M. O. Atterbury and Joe Collins.

In January, 1945, Carver was transferred to San Point, Seattle, where his work consisted of aerial photography, general laboratory work and public relations photographer. He was discharged last October and with his wife and small daughter, visited in Belvidere, Ill., before returning to Medford to re-enter business.

The action releases manufacturers of certain worsted suiting fabric from the maximum average price order which requires them to balance higher priced cloth output with the manufacture of cheaper fabric.

GREEN ENLARGING FOUNTAIN STORE

Enlargement and extensive remodeling and redecorating is being planned for Green's fountain and news-stand store at the corner of West Main and South Fir streets. Ralph Green, co-owner in the business with his father, Walter D. Green said today. The new establishment will use the space now being occupied by the Spencer-Bagley agency which will open in a new location, 224 West Sixth street in the Holly theatre building March 2.

Green stated that the additional space will give the business a 35-foot frontage on West Main street. The partition between the old store and the former agency office will be removed and the ceiling lowered, Green explained, and the walls will be decorated with oil murals to be painted by a Hollywood artist. A new fountain, counters, magazine racks, cases, stools and booths will be installed, with a color scheme of brown and green, with accents of red, planned.

New equipment has already been purchased and merely awaits redecorating of the building interior, Green stated. It is thought the remodeling will be completed by April 1.

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POPE ENVISIONS WORLDWIDE WISH FOR COOPERATION

Vatican City, Feb. 26—(U.P.)—Pope Pius said today he saw abundant evidence of a worldwide wish to work together in a great restoration of human society and establishment of an order founded on truth, justice and love.

The Pope spoke at an unprecedented audience for the College of Cardinals and the Vatican Diplomatic Corps. The audience in effect was a consistency further extending the ceremonies of last week in which 32 prelates were elevated to the cardinalate.

The audience followed Francis Cardinal Spellman's challenge to the "attackers of religious freedom in many parts of the world." The New York cardinal said it was the duty of the church to stand against the "wave of militant atheism." He spoke in taking over the titular church of Saints John and Paul.

The Pope spoke in response to greetings by Antonio Pa-

cheo, Portuguese ambassador to the Holy See and dean of the Vatican Diplomatic Corps.

"We see in this common gathering a manifestation of spontaneous adhesion to the great principles of peace and unity," the holy father said.
