SIMPSON SIGNS AS HEAD GRID MENTOR AT SALEM

Al Simpson, head athletic coach at Medford high school for the past two years, said today he has signed a one year contract as head football coach at Salem high school. He will take over his new duties next fall.

During his two seasons as football coach of the Medford Black Tornado, his teams have won 19 games and lost one. In 1944 he won the state high school championship, taking 10 straight victories which was topped by a 14-0 defeat of LaGrande for the title. Last season his team won nine straight games, only to lose a 7-6 decision to Grant of Portland in the semi-finals of the state championship playoff.

43 Hoop Wins

Simpson has rolled up a record of 43 basketball wins and eight losses to date in two seasons here.

The 29-year-old coach came here from Ashland where he guided the athletic destinies of the Grizzlies for one year, winning seven football games and losing two and taking 21 basketball victories against eight defeats. His 1943-44 Ashland high basketball team won the state championship.

Served in Army

Simpson's coaching career started at Ashland junior high where he was athletic boss for three years. He served one year in the army prior to taking the Ashland high school job.

Under present plans, Bill Bowman, athletic director at Medford high school, will become head football and basketball coach, beginning next fall.

MOBILGAS TRAMPLES MEDFORD HOTEL FIVE

Mobilgas grabbed a tie for third place in the Southern Oregon independent basketball league last night when they swamped the Medford Hotel 40 to 27 at Jackson school. HORSEMEN MEET WITH BOARD IN RACING STRIKE

Arcadia, Calif., Feb. 27.—(U.P.) A four-day armistice in the bitter Santa Anita race track controversy expired today as striking horsemen met with the California racing board.

Principal stumbling blocks to settlement of the dispute were the horsemen's demand that no license be revoked without a hearing and that the board issue a license for the next year to anyone in good standing at the close of the preceding year.

No one had been denied a license without a hearing since he had been on the board, Chairman Lloyd Wright said, and anyone whose license was not renewed at the start of the year could obtain a hearing.

Dr. Charles H. Strub, executive vice president of the elaborate racing plant, had threatened to cancel the remaining 14 days of the winter meeting unless it was conducted peacefully.

ROGUES TO PLAY CENTRAL PT. FOR "B" LOOP CROWN

Garnering preliminary playoff wins in tilts on the Medford high school court last night, Central Point and Rogue River will battle on the same floor this evening for the Southern Oregon Class "B" league diadem.

Tonight's victor will contend with Merrill in a Klamath county arena Saturday for the "B" district five title.

In the opening fracas of the play-off Central Point overwhelmed Gold Hill 50-29. Starting to click after the Beavers had run up a 7-6 first quarter lead, the Pointers romped to a 25-12 advantage at half-time. Milkowski of the losers was high point man with 15 while Hargus Colley and Les Hansen each sank 13 for Central Point.

Rogue River nosed out Jacksonville 33-31. The Redskins, making it hot going all the way for the winners, were in front 15-14 at the half. Rogue River came back to take the long end of a 22-21 margin at the close of the third canto and lengthened the lead to 33-27 with two minutes left in the fray. Forty fouls, 21 on the Rogues and 19 on the Redskins were charged in the rough affair. Each team dropped in 13 free tosses.

The championship fight this evening should prove a hectic mix. Rogue River and Central Point split the two contests of their conference series and, except for the Rogues' height advantage, are evenly matched. The Pointers were drubbed by the Rogues in the 1945 play-off and will be out for revenge.

Vieing for third place, Gold Hill and Jacksonville meet in the opening game at 7 o'clock.

Ducks Tip Idaho 43-40

Moscow, Ida., Feb. 27.—(U.P.)—Idaho University and Oregon State were tied for the Pacific Coast conference northern division basketball lead again today following Oregon university's 43 to 40 victory over Idaho here last night.

Idaho meets Washington State, and Oregon State plays Oregon in the final contest of the regular season Saturday.

The leaders are deadlocked with 10 wins and five losses. If both win Saturday, a playoff would be necessary to determine which will play University of California, southern division champs, at Berkeley, March 8-9, for the conference crown.

Forward Dick Wilkins of Oregon broke a 40-40 tie with two minutes to go last night, and Bob Hamilton put the contest on ice for Oregon with a free throw 15 seconds before the end of the game. Oregon held an 18 to 14 halftime lead.

Wilkins was the game's leading scorer with 12 points.

CONDITIONS SEEM DULL AT TORNADO BASKETBALL CAMP

Conditions didn't look too bright out at the Medford high school basketball camp this morning when it was reported that Don Waldron and Earl Stelle had been added to the sick list. The list already included Bob Watson, Jim Cave, Carl Reich and Jerry Ross.

The "sick list" is "under the weather" with heavy chest colds which seem to be making the rounds of the Tornado ranks, and with the crucial Southern Oregon district playoff but two days away. Whether they would be able to play or whether Medford's chances of winning would have to be on the shoulders of the second string, Coach Al Simpson was unable to say this morning.

Ashland and Grants Pass are scheduled to open the tournament, taking to the Southern Oregon college court at Ashland at 7:30 p. m. Friday. Medford and Klamath Falls clash in the second game, starting about 8:30 or 8:45 p. m. Saturday night the winners get together for a berth in the state tournament at Salem March 13, 14, 15 and 16, and the losers battle it out for third place with Al Lightner of Salem and Chuck Schmidt of Eugene tooting the whistles both nights.

Kewpie Barrett Is Pitching Holdout In Portland Camp

San Jose, Cal., Feb. 27.—(U.P.)—Pitcher Dick (Kewpie) Barrett was still a holdout today, although he continued to work out with the Portland Beavers at their spring training camp here. He had a long-distance telephone confab with Beavers' General Manager Bill Klepper yesterday regarding his 1946 salary and an agreement was expected shortly.

Five more regulars checked in yesterday to increase the camp population to 24 regulars and 10 players of the Salem, Ore., team who are trying out with Portland.

The preliminary game features the SOC second team against St. Mary's of Medford.

MORSE APPROVES KRUG NOMINATION

Washington, Feb. 27.—(U.P.)—The nomination of Julius A. Krug as secretary of interior appeared headed for senate approval today despite a notable lack of enthusiasm among western senators.

Many prominent republicans and democrats joined in praising the public record of the 38-year old Wisconsin new dealer who headed the war production board during the final phase of World War II.

Even among westerners there was acknowledgement of his ability. But they made no effort to hide their disappointment that President Truman didn't pick a man from their own region. They wanted a man with intimate knowledge of the grazing, mining, irrigation and reclamation problems peculiar to the west.

Sen. Wayne Morse, R., Ore., called Krug a "devoted public servant" who "stands in a class by himself compared to some of the appointments the president has made recently."

TO DELOUSE JAPS

Tokyo, Feb. 27.—(U.P.)—Tokyo citizens will be thoroughly deloused under a plan submitted to the Japanese government today by supreme allied headquarters. Five politely-termed "typhus control teams" will tour the capital daily, vaccinating and delousing all suspected disease-infected persons and areas.

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CHRISTIAN SCIENCE LECTURE GIVEN BY P. A. HARSCH, C.S.B.

A lecture on Christian Science, entitled "Christian Science: The Religion of Reality," was given last evening at the Holly theatre by Paul A. Harsch, C.S.B. of Toledo, O., member of the Board of Lectureship of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass.

The lecture follows in part:

The year 1866 was deeply significant in world history. It brought to mankind the discovery of Christian Science. In these United States it was also rich with promise, for there just had been brought to a close that specific effort of evil to destroy the unity of the states comprising the Union, which we know as the Civil War. The significance of the coincidence of these two events should not be overlooked.

The Civil War years were most critical ones in our history. A New England thinker encouraging his fellows in that trying time wrote impressively. One of his poems may be found in the Christian Science Hymnal. In it he says:

"Oft to every man and nation Comes the moment to decide, In the strife of Truth with falsehood,

For the good or evil side." Then, after referring to the fact that evil seems so often in the ascendant while truth is obscured, he declares that

"... behind the dim unknown Standeth God within the shadow, Keeping watch above His own."

It was in that remarkable year of 1866 that the light of divine Truth came to Mary Baker Eddy and illuminating "the dim unknown" disclosed Deity to be indeed an ever-present and available reality, a constant protection and a divine inspiration. God was no longer "in the shadow." He now stood revealed.

The "Dim Unknown" Revealed It was in this light that men began to discern more clearly the truth about God and man. Discerning and applying this truth has enabled them in increasing numbers to live more wholesomely, happily, and joyously.

This enabling light of divine Truth was named by its Discoverer Christian Science. We have come together to consider this discovery, which we shall speak of as the religion of reality.

This religion of reality, this divine Science or Christian Science, begins its corrective work at the point of inception of moral discord. It shows where and how disease and inharmonious origin and how they may be avoided or prevented.

It is, therefore, a healing and preventive system. It should be stated at once, however, that the healing and preventing of physical ills are by no means the whole of Christian Science or even its most important purpose. The healing of disease is the proof which Christian Science submits that it is the true and absolute plan of salvation for all humanity.

A Universal Boon

Because this is all true, Christian Science may properly be called a universal boon. This is not to claim that sickness is universal and that all mortals are in need of physical healing, though no doubt it will be conceded that all are in need of salvation. Few indeed, however, are exempt from one or another of those disease-breeding conditions, some of which have already been mentioned and which include fear, envy, distrust, tormenting lack, limitation, the belief of separation, and so on.

Unless the presence of these mental conditions is detected (and frequently they are hidden deep in the subconscious mind) and then destroyed, physical disease may and often does result. We shall consider some of these beliefs, their origin and the necessity for casting them out of consciousness. The process of evicting such unwelcome tenants is explained simply and logically by Christian Science.
