86 NEW CASES OF MEASLES LISTED

Measles continue unabated in the county, with 86 new cases reported to the Jackson County Public Health department during the week ending Feb. 23. Of the total, 66 cases were in Medford, eight in Central Point, five in the Oak Grove district, two each in Ashland and Rogue River and one each in the Howard, Antelope and Lone Pine districts. Also reported were four cases of pneumonia, three in Medford and one in Eagle Point; one case of scarlet fever in Medford; one case of chickenpox in both Rogue River and at Camp White, and two cases of recurrent malaria, both in Medford.

TOMATO GROWERS SLOW IN LISTING LAND FOR PLANTS

A lack of applications for plants by prospective tomato growers indicates a small valley crop this summer, according to Ralph Koozer, manager of Bagley Canning company at Ashland. Koozer said the cannery is in need of more growers and urged farmers who are willing to raise tomatoes to contact him at once so that plants may be obtained.

Koozer said that W. C. Blankenship, 244 South Central avenue, is now employed as a cannery field man for the Bagley concern and may be contacted regarding plants needed for the summer crop.

Offer Profit Sharing
Considerable interest is being shown in a profit sharing plan for tomato and peach growers which was recently introduced by the cannery, according to Koozer.

It has been proposed to establish a tomato receiving station at Central Point if production merits it, the manager said.
