

SOUTHERN OREGON HISTORIANS NAME MAYOR PRESIDENT

Organization Outlines Projects With Museum At J'ville Among First Plans.

Formal organization of a Southern Oregon Historical society was completed at a meeting of interested persons held yesterday at the office of Mayor C. A. Meeker. Aiding with organization details was Lancaster Pollard, Portland, head of the Oregon State Historical society, who has been in southern Oregon to attend meetings here and in Klamath Falls.

Mayor Meeker was named president of the society. Mrs. G. Q. D'Albini was elected vice-president, Ralph Billings, Ashland, treasurer, and Lester Harris, secretary and historian. Frank Hull, Sr. Claire Hanley and Ames Voorheis of Grants Pass were named directors and Walter Jones, E. H. Hedrick, Herb Grey, Miss Hanley and Billings were named to the membership committee by the new president.

Museum First Aim
First project of the new group will be promotion of the plan to have the old courthouse in Jacksonville converted into a museum, Meeker states. It is planned to secure petition signatures of sufficient quantity to assure a

ballot measure at the next election asking for a special levy for the project, and the museum funds would be administered by the county court.

It has been the plan of those interested in the museum project to ask families of the area having objects and articles of historical value to loan them to the museum in order that they might be displayed for the general public. Meeker announces that the state society has promised support for the project and will loan back to the southern Oregon group for the museum certain historical articles now in state custody.

Value Seen
"It is believed the local historical group can be of great value in gathering local historical data and records, preserving objects, buildings and sites of historical interest and in co-ordinating the efforts of such historically minded groups as the Jackson County Pioneer association, Daughters of the American Revolution and Sons of the American Revolution," Meeker states. "This section is rich in Oregon history and tradition and we have delayed too long in taking steps to properly care for these buildings and articles and in gathering and tabulating records and information."

In addition to the Jacksonville museum, other projects to be considered are aiding the Klamath Falls society with a celebration to mark the 100th anniversary of opening of the pioneer Klamath Falls-Applegate road and planning a proper premiere performance of "Canyon Passage," film made in the county last fall by Universal Pictures of Ernest Haycox' novel of early Jacksonville days.

The society is hopeful of having a membership of 1000 persons within the next few weeks. Meeker states that annual dues will be \$2, half of which will go to the state society.

J. H. OWEN RITES SET FOR FRIDAY AFTERNOON AT 2

Funeral services will be conducted Friday at 2 p. m. at the Perl Funeral Home for James Heaton Owen, who passed away Tuesday evening as a result of injuries received in a traffic accident Monday. The Rev. W. A. Dawes, pastor of the First Baptist church will officiate and interment will be in Siskiyou Memorial Park.

Coming to Medford in 1923, Mr. Owen was one of the organizers of the old Owen-Oregon Sales company, predecessor of the Medford corporation, and was identified with the company and with the lumber industry in the county until his retirement in 1941. Prior to living in Medford the family resided at Brookings, Ore.

Before coming to the west coast Owen had worked as a government contractor for 25 years, having been largely engaged in building Indian schools. While living in South Dakota in about 1898, Owen participated in a political battle to determine the site of South Dakota's capital. Later he served as mayor and chief of police of Pierre, S. D., and was one of the officials who helped to quell the disturbances brought about by "Cox's army" of labor history.

He was born at Watershed, Mich., July 13, 1865.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Fay Owen of 15 Keene Way Drive, Medford; two sons, Harry S. Owen, Glendale, Calif., and Arthur E. Owen, Medford; also one sister, Miss Gertrude Owen of Saginaw, Mich.; two brothers, Will C. Owen, Pontiac, Mich., and Edward A. Owen, Orlando, Fla.; also two grand-daughters, Mrs. Ted Westbrook, Smith River, Calif., and Miss Bessie Owen, Crescent City, Calif.; four great-grandchildren, Catherine and triplets Owen, Joan and Jane Westbrook.
