Another new organization has been formed in the valley—the Southern Oregon Historical society, and among its early projects will be promotion of turning the old courthouse in Jacksonville into a museum. Mayor Clarence Meeker was named president and other officers are Mrs. G. Q. D'Albini, Ralph Billings and Lester Harris. Directors are Frank Hull, Sr., Miss Claire Hanley and Amos Voorhees of Grants Pass.

The state highway commission has formally accepted the gift of Judge Frank TouVelle of Jacksonville of 25 acres of land along the banks of the Rogue River near Bybee bridge as a state park site. It will be known as the Elizabeth Tou-

Velle park in memory of the judge's wife. It is hoped that additional land for the park may be obtained when Camp White is declared surplus.

Snow at Crater Lake National park headquarters, measured this week, is the third heaviest for this period of the year since 1930, when records start. It measured 155.4 inches and had a water content of 68.4 inches as compared to 92.4 inches of snow with water content of 32 inches at the same time last year. Much additional snow falls in March and April. The heavy snowfall in the surrounding hills means ample irrigating water for the coming growing season.

Visitor in the city today is Gov. Earl Snell, here to attend a luncheon and present awards to selective service volunteer personnel. Awards to firms who aided in the victory loan drive last winter were made at a meeting of the Elks during Past Exalted rulers' night. Only individual receiving an award was A. S. Rosenbaum, one of the city's outstanding bond workers. The annual drive for Red Cross funds starts today and F. L. Brewer, chairman, has announced a number of sub-chairmen.

An unusual story originated in Jacksonville, where city officials had the circuit court restrain J. C. McKim from mining operations on F street, claiming the operations have made the street impassable. A hearing will be held next week. Back-yard mining operations have long been a familiar sight in the historic town of Jacksonville.

Medford JayCees enlivened their meeting this week by trying Bob Schenck for "goose murder," charging him with the mysterious disappearance of "Junior," the membership goose. Certain bones were produced as evidence, but the charges were dropped when Schenck found a

new member for the organization.

Plans are being completed for erection of a model temporary dwelling for veterans by a Chamber of Commerce sponsored group. Medco announced in connection with the annual closure for repairs and machinery installation that between Jan. 9 and Feb. 22 the mill produced 10 million feet of lumber enough of which was sold in the Medford area to build 162 medium sized homes.

Foundation for a new eight-band sawmill will be started next week, the new mill to be located near the highway north of town. The mill will be operated by the Elk Lumber company, managed by George C. Flanagan.

Thorburn and Logoso of Seattle have been awarded a contract for installation of new water mains in Central Point, their bid being \$36,990. Work is to start in the near future. A cabinet shop is being constructed in Phoenix by G. L. Witte and Ralph and Walter Green have announced enlargement and remodeling of their fountain and newsstand at the corner of Main and Fir streets.

Veterans who have gone into business recently include Donald Herried, recently discharged from the air corps where he held the rank of lieutenant, who has gone into business with his father, Medford realtor, and Herb Guenther, who with G. J. Wolff has purchased Strahan's Market on North Ivy street. Hal Carver, who spent three years in the navy, has re-opened his camera shop on East Main street and another veteran, M. R. Brownrigg, is opening a repair shop in Phoenix.

Talk of the town centers around the new parking meters. Eighty-four violations were checked the first day and many amusing stories resulted, including the one about the woman who dropped a coin down the pipe on which the meter head was yet to be installed. In spite of the griping, a Tribune poll of users indicated most people think they will improve the parking situation.

Robert A. Naumes, who rose from private to major during four years in the army, and who never was able to return home for a visit during the entire four years, has been released from the army and is now in the city.

Naumes was with the Air Transport command, North Atlantic wing. Dr. Dwight Findley, major in the medical corps who served in Italy, and William M. McAllister, major in a military government detachment in France and Italy, have both returned to the city, the former resuming his medical practice and McAllister his law practice.

Major J. H. Lindley, who served two years in Calcutta with the War Shipping administration, visited briefly in Medford and then left for Washington, D. C., for additional duty.

Home permanently after being discharged are Jack C. Moran, who spent 17 months in Brazil with the air force; Thomas C. Tams, former torpedoman who participated in the invasions of Normandy, Casablanca and southern France; Floyd O. McClanahan, who served in Europe; Earl L. McQuigg, who spent eight months at a navy station on Saipan; Leonard R. Hall, who spent 18 duty with the medical corps in the South Pacific and Bill Hagen, in the navy 23 months.

Lt. S. T. Wharton has arrived from Korea and is on terminal leave. William J. Scheffel has enlisted in the coast guard, Norman W. Vance has re-enlisted in the navy and Everett C. Daugherty, George Meyer and George Cormie have enlisted in the army.

Relatives of Lt. (jg) Theron H. Gleason have received the purple heart medal awarded posthumously to him. Lt. Gleason, fighter pilot, was lost in action July 18 while on a flight off the USS Yorktown.

Talent schools voted down the proposed merger of the Talent and Phoenix schools in a special election last week. Phoenix residents were for the venture. Rogue River VFW has purchased a site for a chapter house.

Hitler and Pope Had Agreement Is Red Contention

Moscow, March 1—(U.P.)—The communist organ Pravda charged today that at the start of the German invasion of Russia, Pope Pius and Adolf Hitler concluded an agreement under which the Pope would be permitted to convert the Soviet people to Catholicism.

The charge was made in a Pravda article written by Ivan Borisov. He said a French book by Gabriel Jarais proved that such an agreement was made.

Catholic missionaries followed the SS, SA and Gestapo into the occupied area by agreement, Borisov said.
