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DR. DAY TO SPEAK TWICE SUNDAY IN LOCAL CHURCHES

Dr. Richard Elsworth Day, internationally known religious leader, will speak at the First Presbyterian church Sunday morning and at the First Baptist church in the evening.

Dr. Day, a native of Indiana, was educated at William Jewell college, Leland Stanford university and University of Southern California and received his divinity degree from Grand Island college, Neb.

He served in California pastorate for seven years was pastor at Phoenix, Ariz., and from 1931 to 1940 was pastor of the Hamilton Square church of San Francisco before being called to be interim pastor for Dr. McGinlay at Central Baptist temple, London, Ont., Canada. He recently entered the bible conference field because of insistent calls for his appearance throughout the country.

Dr. Day has achieved considerable fame as an author, his latest book, "Breakfast Table Autocrat," being published in February. It is estimated that Dr. Day now has about two million readers, insuring large audiences wherever he may be speaking in the U. S. or Canada.

SHEARBURNS END PASTORATE AFTER 4 YEARS SERVICE

Rev. and Mrs. W. Shearburn, pastors of the Foursquare Gospel church for the past four years, have resigned their pulpits and the Rev. and Mrs. Sydney Baxter have been appointed the new pastors.

Reserve Officers Seek Commissions

Washington, March 1—(U.P.)—Reserve officers applying for regular army commissions outnumber the number of peacetime posts available under a new law by better than seven to one, the war department reported today.

A total of 11,063 applications have been received for less than 10,000 new commissions now open. Applications included 38,783 air forces, 14,967 ground forces and 17,313 service forces. Applications close on March 1.

News Behind The News By Paul Mallon

St. Augustine, Fla., Mar. 1—A five weeks' trip through five southeastern states has proved a lesson to me in fretting about Washington.

When the Wyatt housing program came out with its scheme for a government cash bounty to high-cost producers of building materials so as to avoid a price increase and inflation, I went to some leading men in the construction industry, and asked:

Q. "Tell me off the record what you really think about this new housing plan. Will it work?"

A. "We have not read it."

Q. "You have not read the Washington plan which proposes to revolutionize systems in your own industry?"

A. "Well, we have been pretty busy."

Q. "But how can you operate without keeping up with the Washington plan of control?"

A. "Our experience has been that Washington has a new plan every day—or well, anyway every week. By the time we

understand the first one, the second one changes it all around. If we kept up with Washington plans, we could not keep up with our business. It is just a question of keeping up with Washington or keeping up with our work, so we keep up with our work."

I LEFT somewhat disillusioned about the wisdom of the federal planning, but still skeptical that these construction people knew their business. My doubts were dispelled a few days later, when (amazingly to me) Washington announced an increase of \$5 per thousand on southern pine lumber to follow the \$5 a ton increase in the price of steel—the two basic materials of the construction industry. Surely enough, these fellows were right. Before the subsidies to avoid price increases had been considered in congress, price increases had been announced in the two lines which mattered most.

Undaunted when the wage-price outfit's program was announced, I sought out leading business men and asked:

Q. "How will your business be affected by the plan to increase wages by 30 per cent over prewar, while limiting price increases to give you a prewar profit, restricted to the number of dollars you made then, dollars now worth half as much?"

A. "What plan is that?"

Q. "Why, the new Bowles anti-inflation plan. It was in all the papers."

A. "Oh that, we read something about it. The papers said we can apply for a higher cell

ing right away instead of waiting six months, but we did not look into it."

Q. "Yes, but the stock market slid down three days running in the biggest drop since the last depression, and the expert analysts tell me, with apparent soundness, that it would put the capitalist economy into a straitjacket which will surely squeeze the life out of it."

A. "Our experience has been that these Washington plans seldom work out the way they say."

Q. "YOU mean Washington says one thing, and then does another?"

A. "Well, yes, in a way. They have to, because they get balled up. I also heard that the nation's No. 1 nudist announced a global campaign to do away with clothing. I just do not think it will work out that way. I will bet you 2 to 1 people will be wearing clothes next year, and possibly the same clothes, unless we get production."

Q. "Yes, but Washington did not sponsor that plan. Washington has great power to work its will."

A. "Well, you can take my word for this—it can't be done. If wages and costs go up, prices will go up one way and another, I do not care what Washington says or does. And if wages, material costs and prices go up, profits must go up. So why should I worry and get myself another ulcer?"

MY disillusionment expanded. It became complete a few days later when the stock market took the same view about profits, rights, itself, and went merrily on its well advised way, for a few days, and then changed its mind a third time to assume again its initial pessimistic downward course.

Ellsworth Files Primary Entrance

Salem, Ore., March 1—(U.P.)—Rep. Harris Ellsworth from Oregon's fourth congressional district today filed for the republican nomination in the May 17 primary election.

Ellsworth is the second congressional incumbent to file. Lowell Stockman, Pendleton, Ore., republican, was the first.

INDIAN LEGION POST
White Swan, Wash., March 1 (U.P.)—The first all-Indian American Legion post was in operation today with a membership of 23 veterans of World War II. The post was organized formally last night when Indian braves, garbed in full tribal war dress, were initiated by American Legion officials.

CLEAR SLIDE ON COLUMBIA ROAD

Portland, Ore., March 1—(U.P.)—A third earth slide on the Columbia river highway near Multnomah Falls was being cleared away today, but state highway engineers doubted the road could be reopened before Saturday.

The slide, smallest of the three, was at the site of the Feb. 5, earth deposit, which closed the highway and the Union Pacific railroad for 10 days. The second slide occurred Wednesday but was being cleared when the third occurred.

R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, announced plans to remove part of the mountainside near the Falls to provide an easy slope, which would have a tendency to prevent future minor slides.

Meanwhile the slide on the coast highway near Manzanita was expected to be cleared today.

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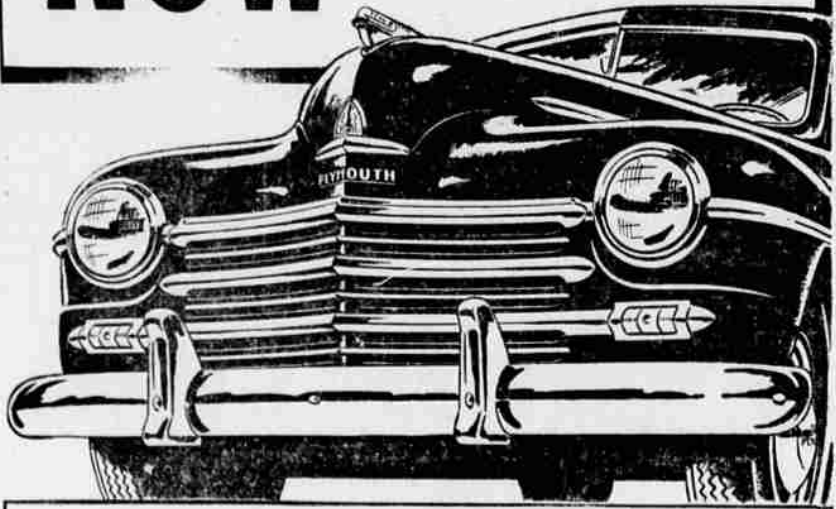
