

C. A. MARSHALL DIES AT COOS BAY HOME

Word was received here today of the death February 29 of C. A. Marshall, 84, former Medford resident, who has been making his home in Coos Bay, Ore.

Marshall, who was associated many years with the Ala Vista orchard and packing house in Medford, is survived by the widow, Mary H., of Coos Bay, and three sons and one daughter, seven grandchildren, two of whom are Ruth Ann and Donald Deen Marshall of Medford, and five great-grandchildren.

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TWO MAIN STREET BUILDINGS SOLD DURING PAST WEEK

Liberty Building Purchased by Leverette and Hall Building by C. C. Furnas

Two major real estate deals, involving downtown business properties were consummated here last week with the purchase by Walter H. Leverette of the Liberty building, located on West Main and Grape streets, from G. S. Butler, of Ashland, and the purchase by Charles C. Furnas of the structure housing his tire business at 322 East Main street, from E. B. Hall, of Medford. Announcement of the sales was made by Elmer Herried of the Real Estate Exchange, which handled the transactions. Amounts involved were not disclosed.

Mr. Leverette, owner of the Leverette Interstate Theaters of Northern Oregon and northern California, plans, according to Herried, to remodel and extensively improve the four-story Liberty building which is one of the larger store and office structures of the city.

Opening the first gasoline service station in Medford in 1919, Furnas has occupied a portion of his newly acquired property for the past 27 years. He contemplates only minor improvements at present with more extensive renovation possibly later. A portion of the building houses The Shack and there are apartments on the second floor, Furnas was mayor of Medford from 1937 to 1940.

"The demand for real estate is very brisk throughout the Medford area," Herried said in reporting the two big sales, "and the demand exceeds sales over ten to one."

In establishing the project, 1,100 club leaders, county extension agents, and delegates at the congress in Chicago early in December analyzed local situations and discussed their solution. Efforts will be made with the support of these delegates to encourage rural young people to attack the significant issues of the new atomic era as related to their local problems.

According to Jossy, "It is the hope that in every local community 4H members will carry on in the same fine spirit as did their delegates to the National Club Congress. In discussing such important issues as housing, health, vocational choices, marketing, distribution, conservation, recreation, and maintenance of world peace, these young people can make a really remarkable beginning in demonstrating how they can develop their own local 4H programs as effectively in solving the problems of peace in this new era of atomic energy as they did in solving the problems of war on the home front."

90 PERMITS FOR HOME BUILDING FEBRUARY MARK

Severity of Medford's housing shortage was shown last month in the great number of home building permits issued by the city superintendent's office. Ninety permits, totaling \$242,162, were issued from the office and included 41 permits for new residences, costing \$136,750; 18 non-residence permits, \$28,075 and alterations on buildings, \$77,337. Last month 84 permits amounting to \$266,865 were given city residents.

Many residence permits called for construction of garages to be used as temporary dwellings.
