INDUSTRIAL TOUR
OPENS TOMORROW

Representatives of a dozen leading Oregon newspapers and wire services will start a 10-day tour of the state's industries at Klamath Falls tomorrow, Monday, March 4.

Sponsored jointly by the National Association of Manufacturers and Columbia Empire Industries, the tour will take the newsmen from Klamath Falls to Medford, Roseburg, Eugene, Salem, Portland and Astoria.

The reporters will visit at least two industrial plants each day to hear top management representatives discuss reconversion problems and progress. A period is set aside after each talk for questions.

At lunch each day the newsmen will hear leading industrialists of each area tell their region's prospects for business growth.

A similar tour of Washington state industries will start March 17.

Washington, March 2—(U.P.)—Charges of illegal campaign fund raising methods and demands for an investigation left republican and democratic congressional leaders unmoved tonight.

Sen. Owen Brewster, R., Me., proposed the inquiry after a witness told the Senate Naval Affairs committee that the Democratic National committee in 1944 proposed a campaign contribution which he believed would be illegal.

Portland Protest

Portland, Ore., March 2—(U.P.)—The British consulate here was picketed more than an hour today by 29 placard-bearing persons in protest of "British imperialism," police reported. The demonstration was orderly and police did not interfere.

British Consul James McDonald was out of town and missed the demonstration.

JOINT STATEMENT BY BIG 3 UPON FRANCO DELAYED

Washington, March 2—(U.P.)—The United States, Britain and France tonight postponed over the week-end a promised joint statement expected to demand the ouster of Gen. Francisco Franco's regime as the price of admitting Spain to the family of free nations.

A State department spokesman said delays in drafting the final text of the statement by cable among officials in Washington, Paris and London were responsible for the postponement.

He emphasized that no serious difficulties have arisen and said the three governments now hope to have the statement ready by Monday. It was scheduled originally to be made public today.

The original proposal was drafted by the United States and submitted to Britain and France. They agreed in principle but asked minor changes.

HEAD NAZI YOUTH TRIED TO RESIGN

Nuernberg, March 2—(U.P.)—Baldur von Schirach, Nazi youth leader and gauleiter for Austria, wanted to fly to the United States to dissolve the German American Bund and prevent war with Germany, but was refused permission by Hitler, his wife said in a statement today.

The statement made in a letter to Schirach's attorney and made available exclusively to the United Press, said deputy Fuehrer Martin Bormann had called Schirach "unreliable."

Attractive, 38-year-old Frau Henriette von Schirach said her husband had sought to resign his official and party posts.

CAROLINA SOLON DEFENDS PAULEY

Washington, March 2—(U.P.)—Sen. Olin D. Johnston, D., S. C., intensified an intra-party controversy among senate democrats tonight by giving his support to Edwin W. Pauley's fight for confirmation as undersecretary of navy.

Other democratic senators, meanwhile, predicted that the California oil man would drop the five-week-old battle over his nomination as soon as he has answered charges made against him before the Senate Naval Affairs committee.

Johnston entered the controversy with the declaration that Pauley is being "kicked around because he happens to be a man of wealth."

Planing Mill Help Upstate Still Out

Portland, Ore., March 2—(U.P.)—A strike of 700 AFL planing mill workers throughout Oregon continued today with some minor enforcements as several small mills negotiated individual agreements and resumed operations.

Three Salem mills were idled when some 300 men walked off

their jobs to enforce demands for hourly wage increases of 20 cents but 19 mills in Portland, Albany, Newberg and Tigard continued working. The number of idle mills has been set by union officials at 45.

TELEPHONE UNION MAKES PROPOSAL

Washington, March 2—(U.P.)—President Joseph Beirne of the National Federation of Telephone Workers said tonight that the union would "give serious consideration" to arbitration of its \$2 a day wage demands if it is proposed as a means of averting the nationwide strike set for Thursday.

In a radio interview (Mutual), Beirne said that the American Telephone and Telegraph Co. could "have harmonious relations" with the NFW if it directed its subsidiaries "to take
