

# THREE HIT-RUNS AMONG TRAFFIC MISHAPS LISTED

Three hit-and-run auto accidents, along with other minor traffic mishaps, were reported to city police over the week-end. 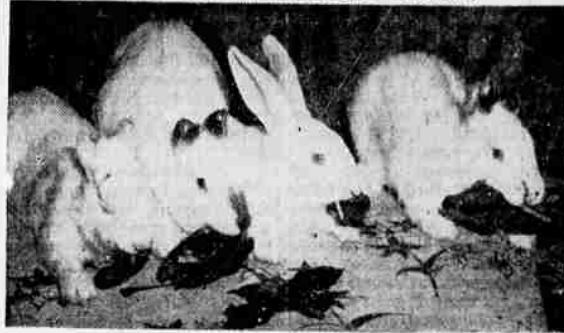
