

Rev. And Mrs. G. O. Baker Plan Evangelistic Tour Via Trailer

Rev. and Mrs. G. O. Baker, who are leaving the local assembly of God church to do evangelistic work starting in March or April, came to Medford from Corvallis in 1944 after being in the Willamette valley town for 3½ years.

Since coming here the Bakers have helped boost Sunday school attendance at the local church from 50 or 60 persons to an all-time high of 325, they said. They also assisted in starting the Valley Center Assembly of God church and the Talent Assembly of God church.

Rev. and Mrs. Baker said they had hoped to see a new church edifice while they were here. They helped to build a building fund of several thousands of dollars and were instrumental in purchase of the new location at Chestnut and Main streets for the new church.

The Rev. Mr. Baker has had a radio ministry, broadcasting over KMED every Saturday morning on a program known as the "Pastor's Call."

When the Bakers came the parsonage was located at 905 East Jackson street. Two years ago that was sold and a home was built at 1409 West Main where the Bakers have resided since.

"The 5½ years have been interesting," they said. During the past two years the Bakers did

not take a vacation. They had planned to go recently.

For five years, up until 1940, they traveled throughout the central, Rocky mountain and western states as evangelists. They are purchasing a new Spartan trailer house and will be on their way about March or April.

They report that they have enjoyed their work here and expressed a deep appreciation for the many things the church and friends have done for them.

Douglas McKay.

All sessions will be open to the public, and interested church people of every Protestant denomination from all Oregon cities are invited.

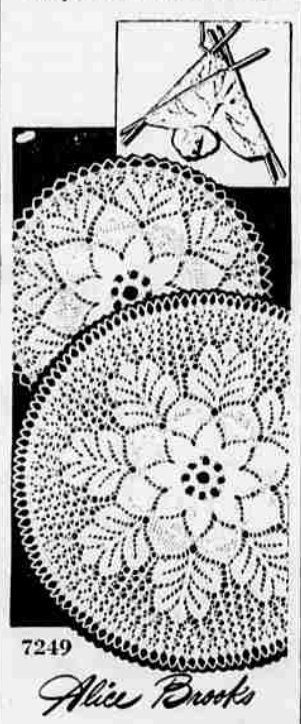
Religious Film Set Sunday Local Church

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Rogue River PTA Hears Address On Delinquency

Rogue River, Jan. 13—Regular meeting of P.T.A. in Fellowship hall, Monday evening was opened by an invocation by Rev. R. F. Wilson. Mrs. Marcia Brown sang, accompanied by Mrs. D. F. Barnett at the piano. The guest speaker, Dr. John Schulz of Southern Oregon college, spoke on juvenile delinquency. There are 700 juvenile delinquents in Jackson county, according to Dr. Schulz and he explained that was the number of juveniles reported as having broken state laws. Dr. Schulz stated an investigation had revealed 80 percent of the Oregon prisoners at the penitentiary had been inmates at Woodburn and in most cases had been in their youth. He recommended a thorough enforcement of truancy laws and stated the present enforcement is inadequate.

More Interest Needed A great aid in combating juvenile delinquency, according to Dr. Schulz, would be more interesting programs of education in such practical subjects as agriculture and forestry and in industries in which students will be employed on leaving school. He suggested agriculture be taught in the schools.

The recent series of sex crimes was mentioned and questions were asked of Dr. Schulz regarding their prevention. He stated ours is a one to one society, one man and one woman create a living unit and establish a home and a family, but some children do not readily learn the one to one way of living and sex education in the schools is intended to help teach them to conform with the rules of our society.

He stated it was his firm conviction that sex education should be taught by the parents, and he felt it would be better for parents and college students, who might be classed as future parents, to be shown such movies as "Human Growth" and to receive training in teaching their children.

Psychiatric Need Dr. Schulz also mentioned a great need for a psychological correctional home for delinquents in southern Oregon. Further business to come before the P.T.A. meeting was the proposed educating of voters on the need of adequate modern school buildings in Rogue River. Arrangements were made to contact all service groups and present the matter to them.
