

Medford Sharpshooters Smack Central Point By 67-32 Score

Medford high sharpshooters paid big dividends here Friday night as the Black Tornado thundered to a lopsided 67 to 32 victory over the Central Point hoopers. It was No. 2 win for Medford in as many Southern Oregon conference starts.

Morris Starts It

Jack Morris swished the first two points for Medford when the tussle was 45 seconds old, giving his teammates the lead. Morris charged through the Medford built count to 6 to 0 before Herb Colley got the Pointers' first tally, two foul tosses at the 3 1/2 minute mark.

The Tornado widened to 16 to 9 at the quarter and 32 to 14 at the half. Medford reserves took charge toward the end of the third period and the canto ended with a 48 to 22 total. The victors outscored Central Point 19 to 10 in the final quarter as reserves of both squads saw most duty. Eight of these Pointers' markers were gift shots.

Five Shots in Close

Neither team got many shots close in during the initial quarter. One cast by Merle Ahorn and another by Colley for Central Point were the only ones good for points. Medford sank four from near the hoop in the second quarter and in the second half penetrated the Pointer defense for 10 more.

Jack Morris with 13 markers and Bob Shores with 11 were chief deadeyes for the Tornado. Dick Gundry compiled seven during his fourth quarter service. Central of Morris' points were in the first quarter. Colley headed Central Point with nine and Mike Trautman rang up seven.

Medford Mentor Frank Roelandt used 13 men during the evening and Pointer Coach Cecil Warner sent 11 into action.

Officials Frank O'Neil and Chief McLean charged Medford with 22 fouls during the evening and Central Point with 13. The home crew canned 11 of 18 charity heaves and the Pointers 14 of 24.

In the preliminary the Tiger Cubs walked over the Central Point Jayvees 41 to 18.

Referee Eddie Joseph disregarded the advice of Ring-Physician Vincent Nardiello last night and stopped the bout at 43 seconds of the eighth round because Young of New York was bleeding profusely from a deep gash around the outer corner of his left eye.

A crowd of 10,024 in the Garden expressed its displeasure by booing loudly and throwing papers and cigar butts at the ring when Joseph awarded a technical knockout victory to Portuque of San Jose, Costa Rica. One irate fan tossed a bottle in to the ring.

Pullman, Wash., Jan. 14—(U.P.) The Washington State college basketball team hung the first conference defeat of the season on the Washington Huskies last night, beating the northern division Pacific Coast conference leaders by a 56-42 count.

The Huskies contributed to their own defeat by sinking only 22.2 per cent of their shots in the first half and only 18 per cent in the final one.

Washington State led at half time 29-22, but the Huskies tied the score at 38-38 in the second frame. During the final seven minutes the Huskies lost their spark and couldn't handle the WSC offense.

Gene Coleman, Washington State's sophomore center, led both teams in scoring with 13 points.

Corvallis, Ore., Jan. 14—(U.P.) Oregon State, sparked by the 29-point combine of Dick Ballantyne and Bill Harper, last night eased into a northern division first place tie with Washington, by thumping Oregon, 65-49, in a basketball game.

After an early 2-all tie, it was Oregon State all the way with the Beavers taking a 29-19 half-time lead.

The Ducks rallied in the second half and managed to close the gap to 4 points, at 40-36, but then Harper sank three baskets in two minutes to widen the gap again.

Oregon had trouble with State's prickly, man-to-man defense that kept most of the Ducks' shooters out of the key-hole and resulted in numerous pass interceptions.

Harper led scoring with 15 points and Ballantyne followed closely with 14. Will Urban of Oregon and his teammate, Mel Krause, each gardenered 11 points to lead the "upstate" club.

Valentino Ducks Match

Portland, Ore., Jan. 14—(U.P.) Matchmaker Tex Salkeld said today that Pat Valentino, San Francisco heavyweight, will not go through with a scheduled Pacific coast championship bout here February 3 with Joe Kahut, Woodburn, Ore., slugger.

Salkeld said he had checked by telephone with Jack Andrade, Valentino's manager, who denied sending a confirmation telegram to the Portland promoter January 1. Valentino, also reached by telephone, said he would not be interested in the fight now, but might be later.

Salkeld said he would attempt to line up a February 3 Kahut date with either Big Bill Peterson, Seattle, or Grant Butcher, San Francisco.
