Miner Trapped By Cave-In Tells Of Experiences While Waiting Rescue

(Editor's note: Joseph Burda, one of two brothers trapped in a coal mine, describes in the following dispatch what it is like to be shut up in the darkness more than 30 feet under the earth's surface for nearly 40 hours.

(As told to the United Press)
Mahoney City, Pa., Jan. 16—(U.P.)—I knew I would be saved. I could hear them working all the while and I felt sure they would get me.

I knew that I was only 30 or 40 feet from the surface and I figured the shovels could reach me.

I didn't know what time it was of what day it was but I figured that at midnight I would set off dynamite to let the rescue workers know where I was.

Cold and Damp
My clothing was light and it was very cold and damp. I only had a little bit of carbide and I tried to make it last as long as I could.

Apple Flavor Ice Cream Perfected in New York At Experiment Station

Geneva, N. Y. (U.P.)—The latest thing in the ice cream line is a product with the genuine flavor of well-ripened apples.

Apple-flavored ice creams have been tried in the past but did not prove satisfactory. The latest development of the New York State agricultural experiment station has overcome previous shortcomings by using a new type of apple juice and apple juice concentrate worked out in its food laboratories.

Ascorbic acid, or vitamin C, is added to the apples just before they are ground and pressed for juice. The result is a juice with a pleasing natural flavor and good color.

By freezing the juice and removing the ice, station workers obtain an apple juice concentrate having more than two and one-half times the soluble solids of the regular juice. The new type of apple juice and apple juice concentrate are the basis of the station's apple ice cream and an apple ice.

"Both the ice cream and the ice have been a pleasant surprise to everyone who has tasted them," said Prof. J. C. Henning.

Chemical Editor Wins Medal From Institute

New York (U.P.)—Dr. Walter J. Murphy, American Chemical society editor, has been named winner of the 1950 gold medal of the American Institute of Chemists for his contributions to the advancement of the chemical profession.

Murphy, of Washington, D.C., will receive the award next May. He was cited as a "great editor, who has focused the world's attention on chemists and their contributions as professional men."

He has been editor of three chemical society publications since 1943.
