Hydrogen Bomb May Open World Deadlock

Washington, Jan. 17.—(U.P.)—The hydrogen super-bomb may blast open the international deadlock over world atomic controls. Whether it will produce an agreement and thus promote the chances of peace remains to be seen.

But some officials and others were hoping today that President Truman, before he decides whether to put this country into the super-bomb business, will make another attempt to end the U. S.-Russian A-bomb race. Decision soon.

Mr. Truman is expected to decide "in the near future" whether to recommend an all-out effort to convert the hydrogen bomb from a theoretical possibility to a practical fact.

The atomic energy commission and the state and defense departments are studying all phases of the issue, including the super-bomb's probable effect on world peace.

Mr. Truman has said he wants world peace more than anything else—and, as an official source expressed it today, "the people want peace more than they want another bomb."

Dilemma Complicated

The president's dilemma is complicated by the fact that the theory of the hydrogen bomb is as well known to Soviet science as to American.

And now that Russia possesses atomic fission explosives, she also possesses the means to make the hydrogen bomb, it is reasoned.

That brings officials back to world controls and the stalemate between Russia and the west in the United Nations. If effective controls cannot be achieved, observers here have said, Mr. Truman would seem to have no choice but to recommend that the United States go ahead and add to its arsenal the most powerful weapon yet conceived.

Hope Echoed

In Chicago today, Methodist Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam said Russia and the United States should "talk it over" before committing themselves to a course which might mean the "suicide" of civilization.

He was echoing the hope of some officials in the Truman administration. Other officials,

General Arnold's Remains Will Be Flown To Capital

Sonoma, Cal., Jan. 17.—(U.P.)—The body of Gen. Henry H. (Hap) Arnold, wartime chief of the U.S. air forces, will be flown to Washington late today for burial in Arlington national cemetery.

Friends and neighbors were to pay final tribute to the veteran aviator from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., when the body will be on view.

Casket Guarded

An honor guard of six non-commissioned officers and an air force lieutenant guarded the casket since yesterday when the body was removed to a funeral home from Arnold's Valley of the Moon ranch.

Arnold died of a heart attack Sunday morning, the fifth in a series he suffered since his retirement in 1946.

The body will be taken some time today from Sonoma to Hamilton field air base. A cordon of troops will line the road from the air base gate for three-quarters of a mile to the C-54 that will fly the body east.

Family To Fly

President Truman's personal plane, the Independence, will carry members of Arnold's family to Washington, where funeral services are scheduled for 3 p.m. (EST) Thursday.

Members of the family include Mrs. Eleanor Arnold, the general's widow; three sons, Lt. David L. Arnold, Col. Henry H. Arnold Jr., and Capt. William B. Arnold, and a daughter, Mrs. Lois Snowden.

The sons will accompany Mrs. Arnold, as will her son-in-law, Navy Cmdr. Ernest Snowden. Mrs. Snowden will join the family in Washington.

2 Americans, German Arrested For Robbery

Bremen, Germany, Jan. 17.—(U.P.)—Two American soldiers and a German garage owner have been arrested in connection with an \$83,000 marks (\$40,000) bank robbery.

The soldiers, whose names were withheld, are enlisted men in the Bremerhaven port of embarkation, an army announcement said.

Lt. Col. R. J. Schuetz, provost marshal, said the German garage man was picked up on a tip from one of his employees who noticed that his boss carried a green barracks bag similar to one described in a police alarm on the robbery.

A police search of the garage turned up the bag, crammed with money.

Eyewitnesses said two soldiers, wearing civilian overcoats and hats, entered a branch of the Norddeutsche Kreditbank on Friday and robbed the bank employees at gun point.

Fire Destroys House At Trail Community

Trail, Jan. 17.—Fire of undetermined origin Saturday night completely destroyed the house belonging to Mrs. Alberta Hughes, but the occupants, Mr. and Mrs. Al Hudson and their children, aged three and four, escaped without injury.

The house, located next to the Trail schoolhouse, was one of the oldest in the community. It was a total loss, and only a few personal possessions of the Hudsons were saved.

The Hudsons found a place to live in Shady Cove, but Trail neighbors collected gifts of food, clothing and money to assist them.

Few Voters Cast Ballots In Finland

Helsinki, Finland, Jan. 17.—(U.P.)—Only a thin trickle of voters braved 13-below-zero temperatures today to cast their ballots on the second and final day of Finland's first presidential election since 1937.

Shivering election officials at deserted polling places estimated today's turnout would be less than the estimated 30 to 35 per cent of the electorate who voted yesterday.

The voters will name 300 electors, who in turn will elect the president. President Juho K. Paasivirta, 80, is favored to succeed himself. He is opposed by the agrarian speaker of parliament, Dr. Urho Kekkonen, and the pro-communist democratic union's Mauno Pekkala, a former premier.

Evangelist Graham Draws Huge Crowds

Boston, Jan. 17.—(U.P.)—Evangelist Billy Graham went to Providence, R. I., today to spread his warning of "God's judgment" after a monster Boston garden rally at which he estimated some 2,000 persons hit the "sawdust trail."

He was to address students at the Providence Bible institute and later leave for Toronto for a three-day stand.

Nearly 16,000 persons jammed the garden and some 4,000 others were turned away by police as Rev. Graham wound up an 18-day revival during which he claimed 3,500 conversions.

The 29-year-old evangelist said he would return to New England beginning March 26.

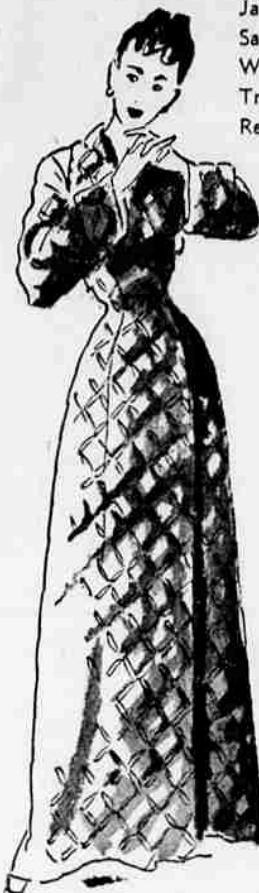
