Health Officer Speaks For Howard PTA Unit; Children On Program

Dr. A. Ervin Merkel, county health officer, spoke at the meeting of Howard Parent-Teacher association held Friday in the music room of the school with 35 members in attendance. His topic was "Rheumatic Fever."

Highest incidence of the disease is among children in the six to nine year old group. Dr. Merkel said and added that there are about a million sufferers from the disease in the United States, mostly children.

Evidence indicates that there may be some hereditary factor in rheumatic fever, the speaker said, and attacks often follow other respiratory infections. He spoke of symptoms of the disease, and said that proper management of the case is very important.

Two small musicians from the fourth grade of the school, Randall Campbell and Fred Fossel, played piano solos and a western folk song to the tune of "Oh, Susanna" was given by the fourth grade under the direction of Mrs. Arthur Oetjen.

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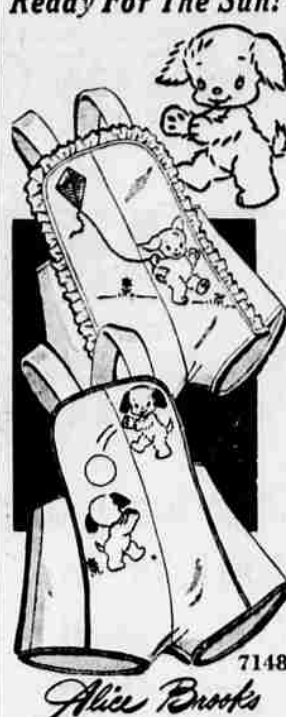
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Sorority Entertained At Meeting Thursday

New York — What will the 1950 spring bride wear? "Pale pink organdy with a 'Little Women' look if she's the prototype of The Bride's magazine's cover for early spring, previewed in a fashion show at the fifteenth bridal business clinic. This annual 'school' produced by Brides House, Inc., rated attendance by representatives of 500 leading department and specialty stores over the country."

Other fashion news that bridal consultants, bridal buyers, and other store executives found at their yearly session of classes was the monochromatic wedding party—colors of one family in different tones, grading from beige and yellow, to burn straw. Long satin "domino" coats to cover wedding dress glamour fittingly can be used for dramatic evening wear later.

Bridesmaids who can change their accessories and become belles of the ball at parties showed the trend to real party dresses that The Bride's magazine suggests to the practical members of today's wedding party.

An outdoor wedding goes "back to nature" with flowers, birds, and bees featured in the wedding dress, the bridesmaids' accessories, and the headresses. For a dramatic finale—a whole wedding party dressed in palest blush keyed today's fashion that a wedding can be "in the pink" if the bride feels she would like to break away from traditional white.

"Planned perfection" for a successful wedding day is stressed. The plan for 1950's bride reflects fashion's neat head, the hand-spun waist, skirts belled out with numerous crinolines to fill the aisle. Wedding hats replacing floral headresses gives new importance to the head—and often show the roundness of it in cloche wedding hats.

Flowers look new, too, in arrangements suggestive of old French flower prints. Bouquets in carefully-planned, delightfully carefully collected confusion of colors as if they were flowers just picked from the garden. This looseness of arrangement and variation of color contrasts with the usual formal look of stiffly-balanced bouquets in blank one-color arrangements.

The bride's mother has a new look, too, in navy blue. Navy looks refreshing after the monotony of faded pastels, and is universally becoming, especially to mature figures. While black for the mother of the bride is proper in many foreign countries, it is not acceptable in ours. Navy has all the chic of black and stays within propriety.
