The nurse will show a film entitled, "Kids Must Eat" and also a dental film relating teeth to general health.

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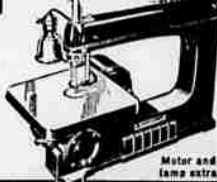
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Illustrious Couple To Be Club Guests In Medford Monday

"The New India" will be the topic for talks to be given by Krishna Nehru, sister of India's prime minister, Jawaharlal Nehru, and her husband, Raja Huthesing, when they speak in Medford Monday, January 23. The two will be guests of the Rogue Valley Knife and Fork club for the January dinner at the Rogue Valley Country club.

During their talks they will interpret the role of their country in uniting the divergent nations of Asia and will explain the relationship of India to the United States.

Krishna Nehru was active in India's fight for independence from British rule for a quarter of a century, and with her brother and other members of her illustrious family was imprisoned more than once for political reasons. Her three books, "With No Regrets," "Shadows on the Wall" and "Story of Gandhiji" have been published in this country.

Raja Huthesing, assistant editor of a leading Bombay newspaper, was educated at Oxford and is a keen student of world affairs. He is now joint-secretary of the national planning committee for economic development for his country.

It is said that the Huthesings captivated American audiences with their beautiful English, authoritative speech and oriental charm.

Herbs should be bought in small quantities, and dried varieties should be kept tightly covered as they lose strength rather quickly, members were told.

Mrs. Nagel suggested using a mow wheel, sunk in the ground, as a frame for an herb garden, planting the various herbs between the spokes. Anyone interested in further study of herbs may write to the superintendent of documents at Washington, D. C., enclosing 10 cents for bulletin No. 1977 on "Savory Herbs, Culture and Use," it was stated.

Lecture On Birds Given For Rogue River Club; Arrangements Displayed

Rogue River — Rogue River Garden club members heard a lecture on birds given by Mrs. Clarence E. Wohlford at the regular meeting in the grange hall on January 12. Mrs. Wohlford at one time owned a bird farm in southern California where she successfully raised Mexican cardinals, a feat known to have been equaled by one other person.

Mrs. Wohlford urged that wild birds be generously fed through this stormy winter, and sighted the many insect eating birds who aid the farmer and fruit grower in controlling the pests that prey on garden and orchards.

In demonstrating the method of placing feed for birds Mrs. Wohlford used a roofed tray of white pine with two compartments which had been made by Walter Carroll of Rogue River.

An appropriate decoration on the speaker's table was an arrangement of English laurel, which supported a woven bird's nest with four small eggs.

The base of the arrangement was a hollow moss covered log. Other floral displays exhibited by Mrs. Fay Rose, horticulture chairman, were composed of three varieties of everlasting flowers, cupid's dart, globe amaranth and helichrysum, which were grown in the gardens at Rose Acres.

Tiny scotch bluebells, squaw cotton and miniature dogwood blossoms that were picked and pressed by Mrs. Neville Abbott at Anchorage, Alaska, formed another exhibit of great interest.

"The squaw cotton," wrote Mrs. Abbott, "was picked in a huge muskeg meadow; large fields of it appear silvery white, while in the same meadow growing purple wild iris and masses of fuchsia colored shooting stars. The meadow in near Matanuska valley and a favorite grazing ground for moose. On a recent drive to the valley a moose cow and two calves were sighted, a beaver hurried across the road ahead of the car and a wild duck with several ducklings were seen by the road side. The natives use the little dogwood flowers as motifs for jewelry, carving the tiny white petals of ivory and using gold nuggets for the centers. It's quite expensive."

The first lesson of the series on flower show practice was conducted by Mrs. Sam Bellah, and through that means attention was called to the spring flower show to be held in Rogue River. A flower show has a two fold purpose, according to Mrs. Bellah, education and pleasure.

The foundation of a successful flower show is the choosing of a site and the early appointment of chairmen of the proper committees.

Salem, Ore., Jan. 18—The Chin-Up club of Oregon received 530 letters of inquiry, many of which included donations, in seven months after a story appeared in Coronet magazine concerning Beth Sellwood, president and founder of the club. Miss Sellwood has reported.

The article appeared in May, 1949, and donations since then totaled \$1,128.79, she said. Of the amount, \$789.79 is for the building fund. Most inquiries concerned the club project of establishing a home for handicapped people to give them an opportunity to obtain an education, learn a trade and create their own jobs.

Miss Sellwood expressed her thanks to the magazine, Writers Norman and Amelia Lobenz, newspapers, radio stations and readers who showed their interest.
