Juvenile Court Has 442 Cases In 1949

In his annual report of children's cases handled during 1949, John Richard, county juvenile officer, said today his office had disposed of a total of 442 cases during the year. Of the total, 313 cases involved delinquent children and 125 were dependents. Five were special cases.

Ninety-five cases were handled officially through the chambers of Circuit Judge H. K. Hanna and 348 were disposed of unofficially either by Richard or his deputy, Miss Helen Busenbark. Ninety-seven children were detained in jails or police stations during the year and 130 youths were placed under the supervision of the probation officer. The majority of the cases involved boys in the 15 to 16 year age group.

Timber Land Sale By Ashland Again Plagues Council

Ashland, Jan. 18—The proposed sale of city-owned timber property, which Ashland city councilmen thought had been decided, was brought before the group again at its regular meeting last night. City Attorney Harry Skerry Jr. said a provision in the charter limited the city in its right to dispose of property.

It will be necessary to check the deeds of all sections of land involved in the proposed sale to the forest service before the transaction can be completed, Skerry said.

McNair Appointed—Harry McNair, former assistant fire chief and acting chief before the retirement of Clint Baughman January 1, was made permanent chief by appointment of Mayor Thomas S. Williams. Other appointments included the renaming of L. Peers Wilmuth as city judge, and Frank Davis as cemetery superintendent.

Councilman Fred Homes was again selected by council members to serve as chairman of the council.

Problem of locating a new fire station again was considered by the council, which previously had decided to make use of a garage building on Third street, and then changed its mind after buying the property. The council approved the request of Dom Provost for a 30-day option on the property at a price of \$13,000, but the matter was still undecided after the meeting.

Site Considered—A site at First and C streets is under consideration for the proposed new fire hall.

Duties of the city and electrical engineers were outlined in an ordinance presented at the meeting, and action on the proposal will be taken at a later meeting. Lease of 12 acres of land adjacent to the cemetery to J. P. Clark for \$360 per year was approved by the council. The area will be used for gardening, Clark said.

No new discussion of a proposal to bring Bonneville power to Ashland was heard at the meeting, but it was reported that John Boyle, general manager, and Seth Bullis, Medford district manager of the California Oregon Power company, will meet February 2 with councilmen to discuss sale of Copco's facilities in the Bellevue area to the city.

Specifications For Office Building Here

Plans and specifications for a building to house a Medford branch of the secretary of state's office have arrived here and are now available to interested builders at the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce in the Medford hotel.

Builders interested in furnishing the building and property for lease to the secretary of state may present their qualifications to a local screening committee which will then recommend the best qualified applicants to Secretary Earl T. Newberry, who will make the final selection.

Portland Local Of Newspaper Guild Condemns Action By Meier And Frank

Portland, Ore., Jan. 18—(U.P.)—The Portland local of the CIO American Newspaper Guild has condemned what it called the "use of economic pressure" by a local department store in withdrawing advertising from the morning Portland Oregonian.

Local 165 approved a statement of policy last night by a two to one ratio following a lengthy discussion of the Meier and Frank company's action in cancelling most of its advertising copy in the Oregonian.

Heartwarming to Critics—The statement, introduced by Political Editor Paul Hauser of the Oregonian, said "such an action as we condemn is heartwarming to those critics of both a free press and a free enterprise system who have long maintained that the American press is suborned by its advertisers. We are proud that the Portland Oregonian and the Oregon Journal had published a national labor relations board examiner's report which found adversely against Meier and Frank's labor practices. The Guild said after the story was published:

"On Tuesday, shortly after noon, the first of what were to be 17 separate 'kill' orders on 34 separate advertisements was received by the Oregonian. The advertising had been scheduled and was for the most part already set in type for the papers of January 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8. The first batch of 'kill' orders reduced Meier and Frank advertising in the Oregonian of Wednesday, January 4 to one page, but that page was in the main news section."

"The action, unsatisfactorily explained by Meier and Frank company, can only be condemned by those who cherish a free and honest press. From the as an act of capricious pique or as a threat of economic power facts, it can be interpreted only which a large advertiser undoubtedly possesses."

Would Become Sham—"News suppressed or worded to please an advertiser is not news, and the newspaper which falls into such practices loses its value both to the public dependent on it for fair and honest accounts and to the advertiser. It becomes a sham."

Eugene, Ore., Jan. 18—(U.P.)—A 200-foot section of highway 36 between here and Florence, Ore., dropped 12 feet last night, eight miles east of Florence, the state highway department said.

A parallel railroad was not affected by the rain-caused slide. A highway shovel crew was dispatched from Roseburg to fill in the depression but engineers said dirt would have to be hauled a considerable distance to restore the grade.

Traffic between the southern Willamette valley and Florence was shunted to the Drain-Redford route.
