Socialized Medicine To Stay On England Statute Books Regardless Of Outcome Of February 23 Voting

(Editor's Note: One of the most controversial measures enacted by Britain's labor government during the past five years was its national health plan of socialized medicine. The British Medical Association fought it bitterly, but finally agreed to cooperate just before it went into effect July 5, 1948. In the following dispatch, a United Press correspondent tells of the status of opposition to the plan as the British general election approaches.)

London, Jan. 19.—(U.P.)—Socialized medicine has come to Britain to stay.

Enacted by the labor government in 1948, it will remain on the statute books regardless of the outcome of the general election next month.

Even doctors who prefer free enterprise in medicine have given up their fight to repeal it. And Winston Churchill's conservatives, who know a popular law when they see it, say flatly in their election handbook:

Favors Service
"It can never be too often stated that the conservative party is wholeheartedly in favor of a national health service available to all."

The conservatives concede that a party which opposes free medical and hospital care for all

would have little chance at the British polls, even though the public ultimately pays the huge bill through heavy taxes.

The only questions remaining are how socialized medicine shall be administered, and how much private practice shall survive. The British medical profession as a whole, under leadership of the British Medical Association, abandoned organized opposition to the labor government's national health service in the summer of 1948.

But a core of medical diehards remained. They acknowledged that they could not hope to get repeal of the health service plan, but they began a campaign to correct its "abuses" under the banner of "The Fellowship for Freedom of Medicine."

Amendments Drawn
Heading the fellowship is 79-year-old Lord Horder, King George's physician. Under his leadership, the fellowship has drawn up 10 amendments for presentation to parliament.

"We are not against a health plan," Horder said, "but we are against this one in its present form. We hope the abuses in (health minister) Aneurin Bevan's scheme will be rectified with the help of our amendments."

He said the amendments are designed to preserve private practice on a broad basis as an alternative to complete state control of medicine.

Should Get Choice
"The most important amendment is that every Briton should be given the choice of either remaining in the national health service or leaving altogether and receiving a refund from the state, according to the cost of the service at that particular time," Horder said.

If a Briton remains in the scheme but wishes to occupy a private bed in a hospital or nursing home, he should receive a government grant toward the cost, based on the statistical cost of a bed in a public ward. He should be allowed free drugs and certain agreed appliances.

Scots To Be Asked To Help Homeland

Glasgow (Scotland, Jan. 19.—(U.P.)—The Scots of America will be asked soon to pledge themselves to help Scotland win self-government.

Every American whose ancestors wore kilts and carried a claymore—double-edged sword of the Scottish highlander—will have a chance during the next few weeks to sign the Scottish covenant, a document calling on every Scot to work for home rule.

Copies of the covenant already have been signed by nearly 1,000,000 Scots in Scotland and will be mailed to Scottish societies and organizations in the United States in a few days, according to James A. Porteous, official at the headquarters of the Scottish convention here.

What the Scots want is restoration of the autonomy Scotland lost in local affairs early in the 18th century when the parliaments of the two nations were merged and the country united under the name of Great Britain in 1707.

Berlin, Jan. 19.—(U.P.)—A young Berliner filed suit for divorce from his bride of one day and accused her of "false pretenses and non-existing facts" because she was falsified, the newspaper Der Abend reported today.

Hollywood, Jan. 19.—(U.P.)—Artie Wayne got his big break today. A radio network banned his "Black Lace" record.

A gang of high school kids picketed the studio. . . And it looks like this will put the crooner in the big time.

It almost always works that way. Martha Raye's "Ooooh, Dr. Kinsey" was kicked off the air because its lyrics were "too naughty." Two days later the local record stores were sold out.

Margaret Whiting and Jimmy Wakeley made "Slippin' Around." Network censor gasped and threatened to fire any disc jockey who dared send it out on the airwaves. So far, its sold 1,200,000 copies.

So Wayne is hopeful. He also is confused. He'll be dogged if he can see anything naughty about "Black Lace."

"I can sing it live on the network—if I clean up the lyrics," he grinned. "But my record's banned. And I have a terrible time remembering the approved version."

Line Changed
There's a line that goes something like: "Lady beware. . . It's so apt to tear." That shocked the censors. Now I have to say: "Lady, beware. . . It's so unfair. . . To wear black lace."

The teenagers don't warm up to this watered down version, either. They are, they claim, old enough to know about things like that and if you ask them it's nothing to get all hot and bothered about.

Some 50 or 60 of 'em got together, draped a black lace shawl around their necks, pulled on long black mitts, and paraded up and down in front of the radio station, chanting: "We want Artie Wayne! We want Artie's 'Black Lace'!"

They Hoot And Holler
Every time he gives with the cleaned-up lyrics they hoot and holler.

"They say they want the 'sexy lines,'" Artie grinned. "But I always warn any children

in the house to please leave first."

This isn't the first time a Wayne platter's been nixed by the moral boys. A few years back he came up with the "Chickadee song." That time it was the sound effects that were too sexy.

"It was something about the chickadee lives right, sleeps all day and techie all night. And for the tech-tehs I'd make a noise like a chickadee," Artie explained. "They didn't like it. They didn't like it at all."

But that little ditty didn't make him rich. Maybe, he says, his "tech-teh" weren't naughty enough.

Fir Production In Area Still High

Portland, Jan. 19.—For the fourth consecutive year since the end of World War II, Douglas fir sawmills have shown a gain in lumber production over the previous year, according to H. V. Simpson, executive vice president of the West Coast Lumbermen's association.

West coast mills in 1949 produced 9.59 billion board feet, topping the previous year's 20-year record output by 190 million feet, Simpson said. The region of western Washington and Oregon maintained its leadership, accounting for 28 per cent of the nation's cut.

The lumber leader said shipments of Douglas fir, west coast hemlock, western red cedar and sitka spruce lumber from this region during 1949 totaled 9.868 billion board feet, exceeding orders for 1948 by 1.1 billion board feet.

The weekly average of west coast lumber production in December was 184,427,000 board feet or 115.6 per cent of the 1943-1948 average. Orders averaged 174,994,000 and shipments 187,113,000.

The industry's unfilled order file stood at \$20,346,000 b.f. at the end of December. Gross stocks at \$58,654,000.

December Gift-Fruit Shipments Increase

The Medford office of the Railway Express Agency, Inc., employed 204 persons, most of them local, to handle the shipment of 250 express refrigerator cars of fruit gift parcels during the December shipping period, it was revealed today in a report from the agency. Officials said the figures represented a slight increase over the ship-out from Medford in December, 1948.

The average number of individual parcels in each car shipped varied from 800 to 2,500 depending on the type gift package. The majority were consigned to destinations east of the Mississippi. It was pointed out, however, that the Railway Express figures do not represent the total gift parcel shipment from the valley. Parcel post shipments from each of the eight individual Medford packing firms engaged in the gift parcel trade would account for

a large proportion of the total ship-out.

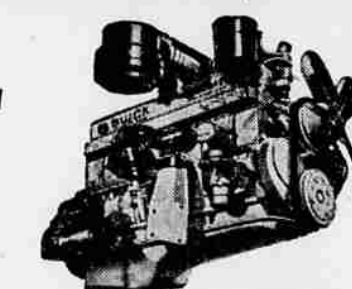
