Hungarian Water Rolls

(Kipfel) Adapted by Mary Mills

Old Country "Float Doh"

Fisher's BLEND ALL PURPOSE FLOUR

BESIDES 4 1/2 cups FISHER'S BLEND FLOUR, sifted and measured—you'll need:

1 1/2 cakes compressed yeast	1 cup rich top milk
2 T. sugar	4 egg yolks
1/2 cup cool water	2 t. vanilla
1 1/2 t. salt	1/2 t. lemon extract
1/2 cup sweet butter	3/4 cup sugar
	2 T. cinnamon

NOW—you can make "FLOAT DOH" Hungarian Water Rolls. Here is Mary Mills' modern version of "kipfel" . . . a treasured Old Country "Float Doh" recipe, sent in by a long-time friend and user of Fisher's Blend Flour. First—mix sugar, yeast and water. Let stand until light and fluffy. Then rub butter, flour and salt together until crumbly like coarse corn meal.

Beat eggs well. Add milk, scalded and cooled, extracts and yeast mixture. Stir this into flour mixture until smooth. It will be a VERY SOFT DOUGH. Do not knead this dough.

Take a clean flour sack free from holes. Dip it in cold water and wring out dry. Lay it flat on table and dust with flour. Put dough in center, bring corners of sack up and tie loosely. Leave plenty of room for dough to expand.

Fill a good-sized container with about 3 quarts of water COOL to the hand. Drop dough in carefully. Set aside to raise. It will float when ready. Lift dough out of water carefully and turn it into a bowl. You will have to scrape dough from cloth. In another flat bowl, have 3/4 cup sugar and 2 table-spoons of cinnamon well mixed. With a spoon, take dough about size of an egg and press it flat in sugar mixture. Take this dough and twist it once or twice to make a roll about wiener size. Shape into a horseshoe . . . and lay carefully in well-buttered pan about 1 inch apart. This will make 25 or 30 rolls. Sprinkle remaining sugar over tops.

Set aside in warm place to raise . . . about 1 hour . . . or until double in size.

Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes, or until nicely browned. For variation, sprinkle with chopped walnut meats . . . almonds cut in slivers . . . or mix 2 tablespoons poppy seeds with sugar and cinnamon . . . and you will have 3 different kinds of roll in one batch of dough.

These are true Hungarian Rolls, or Kipfel, and are very rich. They should have a crisp, sugary glazed crust when baked. This is truly a holiday bread that can be served on any occasion.
