Health Officer Talks At January Meeting Of Central Point Unit

Central Point — At the January meeting of the Central Point Parent-Teacher association Tuesday, January 10, Dr. A. Erin Merkel, county health officer, talked on "The Mental and Physical Development of the Child."

The speaker divided the periods of physical development into five periods, conception to birth, birth to one year of age, pre-school, school age and adolescent. From birth to the pre-school age, the child has very simple desires, Dr. Merkel said, and his development is mainly physical. From the pre-school to school years the child is impressionistic and his mental development begins to take active form, according to the speaker. During a child's school years his mental development takes definite form and by the time he is 10 or 11 years old, he is ready to participate in organized games, the speaker said.

During the adolescent period, physical and emotional development are pronounced, the speaker said, and the child is more open to adult suggestion.

The invocation was given by the program chairman, Mrs. Arnold Bohnert. Mrs. C. A. Meyer was in charge of the music and a trio, Mrs. Meyer, Mrs. Otto Bohnert and Mrs. Cecil Warner sang.

Educational Projects Of PEO Sisterhood Explained To Seniors

Senior girls in accredited high schools of southern Oregon are receiving information this month concerning the educational projects sponsored by the PEO sisterhood, a national organization. This information is being distributed by the educational chairmen of the sisterhood of which there are three in Medford, two in Ashland and two in Grants Pass. The educational loan fund is available to young women fulfilling certain requirements, to complete their college courses, or to take special training of a professional nature, so that they might become self supporting. This loan fund, started in 1907 with one thousand dollars, has been increased and maintained so that nearly 10,000 girls have been loaned four million dollars. Information concerning this loan fund may be had from any chapter of the sisterhood.

Four scholarships of \$125 each are awarded annually to graduating senior girls of Oregon high schools by the Oregon state chapter of the sisterhood. In recent years Miss Mary Virginia Waite of Medford received one of these scholarships to attend Oregon State college and Miss Emma Louise Redbird of Ashland was awarded one to attend Southern Oregon college.

The PEO sisterhood also owns and maintains an accredited junior college for girls, Cottey college, in Nevada. Of interest locally is the fact that two former Medford high school teachers, Miss Maurine Carroll and Miss Carin Degermark are now on the faculty of this college. To encourage attendance at this college, the Oregon chapter of the sisterhood awards annually two scholarships of \$450 each to Oregon high school graduates. This college is fully accredited and maintains high scholastic and cultural standards, it is stated.

Tax Exemptions For Veterans Proposed

Washington, Jan. 19—(U.P.)—Rep. Earl Wilson (R., Ind.) has introduced a bill to provide a veterans' bonus in the form of income tax exemptions.

The bill would grant a veteran an extra tax exemption of \$25 for each six months of honorable service for himself. Each dependent of the veteran also would get a similar extra exemption.

Wilson said that under his plan no revenue would be taken from the government, no large staff of federal employees would be required to handle the "bonus," and the veteran could not speculate or lose all of the bonus money overnight.

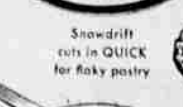
