City Government Topic Of Meeting Of PTA Thursday

Dwight Houghton, member of the city council and local banker, talked on city government at Thursday's meeting of the Junior High School Parent-Teacher association, telling what it cost, how the money was raised, how it is spent and discussing some of Medford's problems.

The speaker declared that city government is a true "grass roots" government since it is close to the people. The people have the right to present complaints or suggestions and they can appear before the city council and argue any point they wish, he said. The council is made up of eight councilmen, two from each of the four wards, and serve without remuneration.

Mr. Houghton said the mayor spends about one-half of his time on city business with no return other than a meager expense account, the speaker said.

Explaining city finance, the speaker said "city government is not the culprit when it comes to high taxation," and declared that the cost of city government for Medford as actually levied on the tax roll is \$13.25 per capita per year on an estimated population of 17,000 people. This amounts to about \$3.15 per person per month, he added.

The city obtains money in four ways, through property taxes, bond issues, special levies and through outside revenue. Mr. Houghton explained, and said Medford's budget for the current year is \$454,824. Of this sum, \$53,000 is expected to be raised from parking meters.

Turning to some of the problems for the coming year, the councilman said the city needs an entire new set of street signs, 575. He said a sample, in a type that is easily read, is located at Main and Central avenues. He also suggested re-naming of some streets where there are duplications.

Mr. Houghton said the Jackson street bridge needs replacement, at a cost of about \$125,000, and that more arterial streets should be opened, probably Jackson and Twelfth streets. He also mentioned that more traffic control devices are needed, that one or more over or under passes on the railroad are needed and that East Main street should be widened.

The speaker also mentioned the public library, saying the city must decide whether to remodel or build a new one, and that the fire department must be more adequately supplied or that fire insurance rates will go up. He further said new buildings are needed at the airport, and that facilities for blind landings are needed.

Also mentioned were improving the channel of Bear creek, the need for a recreational program and study of the acute parking problem. The speaker mentioned that the city of Medford uses three times as much water as any other city of its size in this nation, requiring an adequate sewage disposal unit.

Mr. Houghton was presented by Mrs. A. C. Cameron, program chairman. Music was provided by the entire junior high school orchestra, under the direction of Miss Melba Chehak.

Glenn Linn, principal, announced the first meeting of the newly formed hobby club and urged every junior high school boy to bring his father to the meeting Thursday, February 2, in the girls' gymnasium from 8 to 10 p. m. The round shoulderline in coats, suits and dresses is still soft, but more padded for figure flattery and balance. The cape influence in suits and dresses is seen frequently with adroit handling in capelet shoulderlines. Bracelet length dolman dress sleeves are winning popularity, if there are sleeves at all, as noted in many sportswear versions. High-styled pockets add distinction, and so do buttons, and collar and cuff detail. Graceful asymmetrical lines enjoy full play, as do overskirts, panels, and pleated skirts. Bloused and belted backs are seen in moderation, and ankle length formal gowns are well received with both younger set and matron.

Hemlines are going up but stop between twelve and fourteen inches depending on figure, leg and occasion. Necklines are very low by night, very high by day running the gamut from the intriguing illusion-line to modest shawl collars.
