

Medford Senior High School Band To Play For Annual Winter Concert Friday Night



The 70-piece senior high school band will play several numbers for the annual winter concert of the band and orchestra, set for Friday, January 27, at the high school auditorium. I. A. Mirick, head of instrumental music instruction for Medford public schools, directs the band. The concert is planned each winter not only to provide an opportunity for parents and friends of the musicians to hear them play, but is a means of raising funds which the two musical groups need.

Over 70 Medford high school students will play in the school band at the annual concert for the high school band and orchestra, at the school's auditorium Friday evening, January 27, at 8 o'clock. All common band instruments will be represented with a number of instruments not commonly used, including the bassoon, alto clarinet, bass clarinet, oboe and E flat clarinet, according to I. A. Mirick, head of the instrumental music department and director of the band.

For depth of tone five sousaphones will be used and there will be a quartet of french horns to add tone color and harmony, bridging the gap between the high and low winds. Mr. Mirick states, Eight trombones will be employed for counter melodies and solos and there will be four baritone euphoniums, according to the director. Some 20 clarinets, which are the equivalent of violins in an orchestra, and flutes, cornets, trumpets, percussion instruments and saxophones will complete the symphonic band.

Music will include "Dark Eyes," featuring the clarinet section of the band, led by Miss Frances Zimbleman.

Keith Mirick, Walter Kendall and Ned Landers, cornet trio, who received excellent rating at the state school music contest last year, will play "The Three Kings." A very technical trombone duet, "Swiss Boy," with band accompaniment, will be played by Henry Padgham and Raoul Maddox.

"Fiddle Faddle," heard often over the radio, and "Early California," an overture depicting the music played and sung from Spanish times to gold rush days, are described as two "rousing" marches and will be played by the entire band.
