Hollywood, Jan. 23 (U.P.)—American Press and radio critics have "The Snake Pit," a story about mental illness, as the best motion picture of 1949.

The film received 302 votes from 356 reviewers and 60 commentators to head a list of the 10 best films in a poll by the Film Daily, a trade publication.

Co-starring Olivia de Havilland, Mark Stevens and Leo Genn, "The Snake Pit" was one of four 20th Century-Fox productions to make the first 10.

British Film Named
Runner-up was the British film, "The Red Shoes," produced by J. Arthur Rank. In third place was "A Letter to Three Wives" by 20th Century-Fox.

Others were "Champion," United Artists-Screen Play, s, fourth; "The Stratton Story," MGM, fifth; "Come to the Stable," 20th Century-Fox, sixth; "Home of the Brave," United Artists-Screen Play, seventh; "Command Decision," MGM, eighth; "The Heiress," Paramount, ninth, and "Pinky," 20th Century-Fox, tenth.

For the first time in the poll's history, two sports stories—"The Stratton Story" and "Champion"—made the list.
