College Instructor Speaker For PTA Council Meeting

A good teacher will try to take care of individual differences in students, stated Laurence Butler, instructor at Southern Oregon college speaking at a meeting of the Jackson County Council of Parents and Teachers in Central Point January 18.

Mr. Butler's topic was "Audio-Visual Aids" which he called a "most economical method of teaching the meaning of words and ideas" to the end that each child may have a clear understanding of the subject being studied.

About 85 per cent of "school learning" is soon forgotten, stated Mr. Butler, partly because students have not sufficient interest in their subjects and partly because they do not later use what they have learned. It would be sound economy to utilize a method which would fully stimulate their interest, he said.

The use of audio-visual aids takes care of many disciplinary problems and is invaluable in preparing students to take their place in this competitive age, the speaker declared.

Preceding Mr. Butler's talk were vocal and instrumental numbers given by Ruth Powell, Laurel Jewett, Gail Skymann, Carolyn Hoover, Jerry Kessler, Marvin Bohner and Neil Richardson from the Central Point grade and high school music department.

Mrs. 'Veep' Finds Life In Capital Tougher Than That Of Secretary

Washington, Jan. 23.—(U.P.)—Mrs. Allen W. Barkley is finding life as "Mrs. Veep" far more strenuous than the 8 to 5 workday as a St. Louis secretary.

The friendly, vivacious bride of the vice-president has no desire to become the capital's No. 1 hostess, but she's captured the title of No. 1 guest.

Everyone who is "official"—and many who aren't—wants to meet and fete the newlyweds. As a result, the Barkleys are dated up until the end of February.

Lent Awaited
Mrs. Barkley has had time for only one trip to Capital Hill—on the opening day of congress. She has confided to friends that, much as she enjoys Washington's gay social life, she is looking forward to Lent and an end to the formal social season.

Then she can spend more days watching her husband preside over the senate, learn the workings of the legislative system and occasionally lunch with her husband at the capitol.

Meantime, Mrs. "Veep" has adopted her husband's philosophy—that the American public has a right to know its government officials. But she refuses to believe that people have a personal interest in her. She is determined to fade into the background.

Grants No Interviews
With the vice-president's approval, she grants no interviews even though besieged by requests by practically every reporter on the east coast.

Gossip-loving Washington already has rumored a "coolness" by Mrs. Truman toward Mrs. Barkley. Some say Mrs. Truman disapproved of the vice-president's remarriage. Most old hands around the capitol write off the reported "feud" as idle talk.

At any rate, President and Mrs. Truman were among the first to entertain the newlyweds. One informal dinner for closest friends of the Barkleys was held at the president's Blair house last week. Another is scheduled for early next month.

House Hunting
The "veep" is house-hunting in fashionable Georgetown, but for the present the Barkleys are comfortably settled in the roomy apartment overlooking Connecticut avenue, where Barkley has lived for eight years.

Mrs. Barkley's daughter, 15-year-old Janie Hadley, has made as easy a transition as her mother—from the St. Louis public schools to a private girls' school on the edge of the city. She rides back and forth with Mimi Clark, daughter of Supreme Court Justice and Mrs. Tom C. Clark, who live in the same building. The other daughter, Ann, 17, is in school in New Orleans and will spend vacations with the Barkleys.

Mrs. Barkley hopes before too long that she can give some time to charity work or community organizations. She is her own social secretary and personally answered all the hundreds of letters that came from well-wishers at the time of the wedding. Now, she does let a girl from the vice-president's office help out with answers to people she does not personally know.

Stockmen Will Receive Blanks For Brands

Stockmen who now have recorded brands will receive direct from Salem the blotter and application blank for re-recorded brands. The blotter is for making the exact reproduction of your brand as you use it on the animal. These blotter impressions brands will be photographed and published in the new brand which the state department will issue.

Those stockmen owning more than one brand need not record those surplus to his needs. Persons not having recorded brands may be permitted to register and use those surplus brands after sufficient time has been given to present holders to record them. Applicants for new brands are advised to suggest a first, second and third choice of brands and get approval of a brand prior to having the iron made or using such unrecorded brands on livestock.

All Jackson County Stockmen's association members are also members of this Western Oregon Stockmen's association. A copy of the program is available at the county extension agent's office for any who plan to attend. Rilea W. United Nations Will Work, Mrs. FDR Says

Portland, Ore., Jan. 23.—(U.P.)—Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt says "the United Nations will work if the people of the world want it badly enough."

About 3,000 heard Mrs. Roosevelt's first address before a large audience on the subject of the United Nations since the UN's four general session. She is the only UN woman delegate.

"We are going to keep out of war if we remember how much more destructive the next war can be than the last," she said.

"We have learned to destroy without the atom bomb, very efficiently. If the United States remains militarily and economically strong enough, we can save ourselves and the world."

Before the lecture, Mrs. Roosevelt stopped briefly at the Van Seagraves home to visit her first great-grandchild, Nicholas Delano Seagraves, four months. Mrs. Seagraves is the former Eleanor "Sistie" Dall Boettiger.

Civil Service Tests For State Jobs Dated
Salem, Ore., Jan. 23.—(U.P.)—Competitive examinations for positions in the state forestry department and state parks department will be held to establish eligible lists from which future job vacancies will be filled, the state civil service commission announced today.

Closing date for applications, forms for which are available at state civil service offices here or at Portland or at any state employment service office, is February 25.

The positions are those of forester, timber cruiser and forest dispatcher. Written tests will be given. War veterans get a 5-point preference and disabled veterans a preference of not less than 10 points.

O'Dwyer put an end to rumors that he might quit his \$40,000 a year post because of ill health.
