UNDULANT FEVER TRANSMITTED TO MAN BY ANIMALS
In 1887, Dr. Bruce, a British army surgeon found the cause of Malta fever, while investigating the disease in the island of Malta. This proved to be a bacillus, Malta fever is a disease of goats which is transmissible to man. Subsequently, a disease of cattle, known as Contagious Abortion of Cattle, was shown to be closely related to Malta fever. In 1914, germs found in the aborted fetuses of pigs were also shown to be closely related to the others. Infection of man with any of these germs is called Brucellosis, of which Malta fever is one type.

The disease may be acquired by drinking the raw milk of infected animals but more likely by coming into contact with their raw flesh. Laboratory workers are often infected by direct contact with the germs. Scalding or pasteurization of the milk removes this menace as far as milk is concerned. A disturbing fact is that the germ has been found in certified milk on more than one occasion.

The diagnosis of the disease is far from the simple matter it once appeared to be. There is but one absolutely reliable test for the disease, and that is the demonstration of the germ in fluids or tissues removed from the body. Blood tests—so-called agglutination tests—are sometimes very difficult to interpret. The symptoms, also, are not constant, but vary with the case.

Vaccine treatment has been hailed and condemned with about equal enthusiasm from time to time. Reports of success in vaccine treatment have been subjected to the charge that the diagnosis was not absolutely established in all cases. The mere statement that the blood is "positive" on an agglutination test, can not be accepted as ultimate and final proof of the existence of the disease.

It is estimated that about 10 per cent of all the cattle in the United States may be infected. If this is true, the potential threat to the citizens is great, and the proper diagnosis of the disease is a highly important matter. I repeat here that pasteurization and/or scalding of the milk removes the presumptive risk.

The antibiotic drugs ("wonder drugs") have not proved to be of much help in this disease, to date. Penicillin seems to be totally ineffective. Although the sulfa drugs and the new antibiotic, streptomycin, kill the germs on contact in test tubes, neither of these drugs alone is of value when given after the disease is well established, although in experimental animals they may arrest the disease in the incubative period.

Chloromycetin and aureomycin have been disappointing. However, a combination of streptomycin and sulfadiazine has proved to be curative, if given according to a certain plan of treatment. The addition to this treatment of blood transfusions or plasma, has recently been reported as an improvement in treatment. Still more recently, the beneficial results of a combination of sulfa, streptomycin and aureomycin has been reported.

Doctors everywhere are well acquainted with these advances and it is not necessary for patients to travel long distances to secure this treatment.

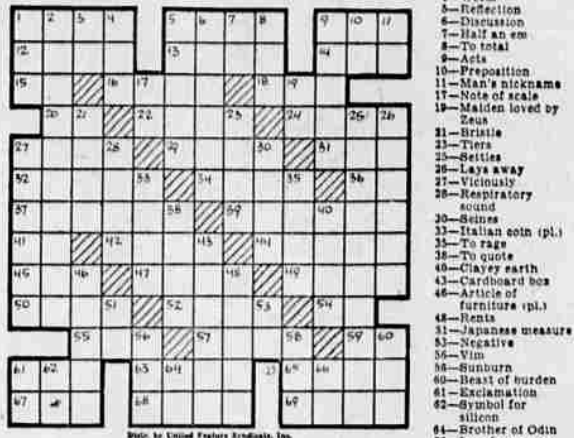

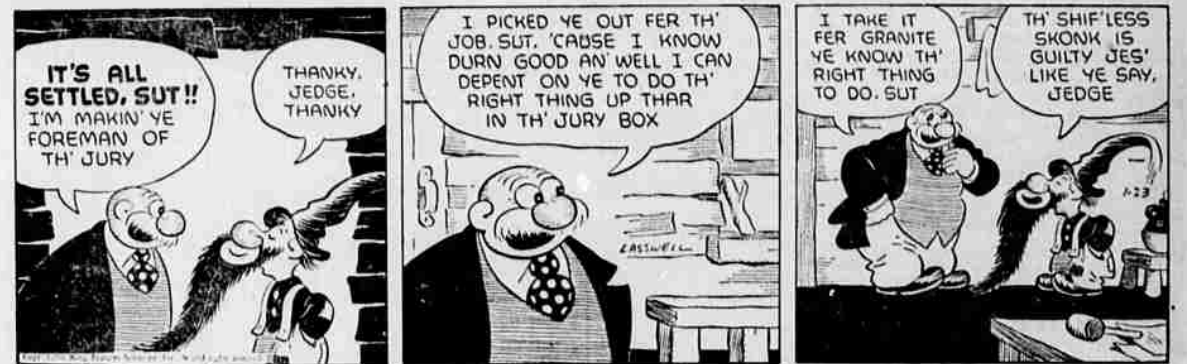
