Union Petition For Election Dismissed

Ashland, Jan. 24 — The national labor relations board has dismissed a petition submitted by the teamsters, chauffeurs and warehousemen's local union No. 962, International Brotherhood of Teamsters, for a bargaining agent election among certain employees of the Magnolia Lumber company here, it was reported today.

The NLRB's refusal was based on a plea by Magnolia that the voting unit requested by the union was inappropriate, seeking to include log truck drivers, relief drivers, servicemen and mechanics.

The order was based on hearings held in Medford on August 17 and in Ashland on October 12.

Circuits Disrupted As Cables Damaged

Portland, Ore., Jan. 24 —(U.P.)—Two cables of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company's main line were ripped apart near Troutdale early today, disrupting telephone, teletype and radio network service to the east.

The cables carry about 300 major circuits, the company said. Authorities said they believed a piece of machinery, possibly a derrick, had ripped the lines apart. Repairs began rerouting lines through the Willamette valley until the cables could be spliced again.
