Bad Check Charges Bring 4-Year Term

Circuit Judge H. K. Hanna yesterday sentenced Roger William McConnell, 46, to four years in the state penitentiary on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses. McConnell had pleaded guilty on a district attorney's information.

District Attorney George Neilson said McConnell had been held by county authorities in 1943 for forging checks amounting to \$369. He had been released at that time when he promised to give the bank a note for that amount as repayment of the funds. He still owes \$99 of that amount, Neilson said, and November 10 he passed \$165 more in worthless checks. Between January 10 and 12 of this year he obtained an additional \$75 with fraudulent checks.

Yesterday's sentence was the culmination of many months' law enforcement efforts, Neilson said.
