



Balanced Budget Object Of Morse, Dairymen Told

Eugene, Ore., Jan. 25—(U.P.)—Sen. Wayne L. Morse (R., Ore.), was to leave here today for a noon luncheon address in Salem after speaking before the 58th annual banquet of the Oregon Dairymen's association here last night.

Morse told delegates he was going to fight for a balanced budget this congressional session. He offered two steps toward cutting \$5,000,000 from expenditures.

Would Cut Defense

He said, \$3,000,000,000 could be cut from defense appropriations because \$15,000,000,000 is not needed for adequate defense.

Morse said some of the saving could be made by setting up a central procurement system for the three armed services. He called for a unification of the procurement system as well as the services.

The senator said the rest of the saving could be made by following the recommendations of the Hoover commission.

On the dairy subject, Morse said he felt repeal of the oleo margarine federal tax would damage the butter industry and the whole dairy industry.

Price Support Quizzed

Morse questioned the present price support program of the department of agriculture, pointing out that the purchase price for butter is established without regard to location of plant or normal seasonal variations of price.

By purchasing directly at plants without any regard to the structure of terminal market prices, Morse declared, the department is placing itself in direct competition with many co-operative associations of producers and with many corporate handlers.

Responding in behalf of the polio organization, Vern Smith, county chairman, exclaimed that the \$2,238 lung will remain in Jackson county for immediate use at all times, except in cases of emergency elsewhere.

Sixty-five persons attended the dinner meeting, which was under the charge of Leo Zupan, president of the Jaycees.

County Disease List Totals 33 Here

Thirty-three cases of communicable diseases were reported to the county health office during the week ending January 21, it was reported today by Dr. A. Erin Merkel, health officer.

Chicken pox still led in frequency, with nine cases in Medford and three in Shady Cove. Mumps, which have been absent from the list for some weeks, were next in number, with eight cases from Medford and three in Phoenix.

Influenza accounted for four cases, three in Medford and one in Phoenix. Others listed included two cases of strep throat infection, one of tuberculosis, one of whooping cough and one of hepatitis (liver inflammation), all in Medford, and another case of hepatitis in Talent.
