

Junior High Tramples Three Pointers Teams

Medford junior high basketball teams made a clean sweep of the tripleheader with teams from Central Point junior high school last night and the local eighth graders came through in the final half to end the C. P. eighth grade winning streak as an evening feature.

The local varsity continued its undefeated string for two years by walloping the Pointers ninth grade quintet 45 to 12, the local eighth graders edged C. P. 36 to 21 and the Bulldog seventh grade team topped the Pointers 30 to 17, in games played in the local gymnasium.

Medford's eighth graders had to rally in the last two quarters not only to outscore the Pointers but also set up a defense that allowed not a single C. P. point in the last period.

Varsity Game Cited
The varsity game while not as one-sided in favor of Medford as the eighth graders' game, did develop into a local walk-away as the local coach used 27 boys to try and keep the score down with the local first string seeing limited action.

Coach Niles Smith's seventh grade team from Medford also broke a Central Point winning streak when his youths dumped the Pointers in the girls' gymnasium here. It was C. P.'s first loss in nine games while the Pointer eighth grade quintet was undefeated in conference.

Local seventh grade reserves played all the fourth quarter and Smith used every member of his squad at one time or another. Scoring in the varsity and seventh grade games by Medford was evenly divided among those playing.

Louis Sends Foe To Mat

Salt Lake City, Jan. 25.—(U.P.) Retired World Heavyweight Champion Joe Louis calmly took everything youthful Rex Layne could throw here in their four-round exhibition last night but sent the Lewiston heavyweight smashing to the canvas in the second round.

Gentleman Joe let Layne bring the fight from every quarter much to the delight of the home fans but he flicked out that lightning left to send Layne sprawling when the Utah boy got too ambitious.

Twice in the last round, Layne drove Louis into the ropes with a hornet-like barrage and the bouncer had to steady himself on the ropes at one point.

Joe said after the fight that Layne was "the best thing in sight" that he had seen in the way of a new talent during his western exhibition tour.

The International Boxing club, of which Louis is a member, plans to "break-in" Layne in one of their three arenas, Madison Square Garden, Chicago stadium or Olympic in Detroit, soon.

Bob Hamilton Claims Canada Stamina Best

Lethbridge, Alta., Jan. 25.—(U.P.)—Lanky Bob Hamilton, former University of Oregon star and Medford, Ore., high school coach, who now is player-manager of the Lethbridge Aces in the International Basketball league, said today he believed Canadian players have more stamina than Americans.

The handsome 27-year-old Hamilton said he thought Canadian players were as good as their U. S. counterparts, provided they received proper training.

Appointed player-coach of the Lethbridge Aces this season, Hamilton has scored 249 points in 12 games. His squad, composed of many rookies, currently is in second place in the league, which has six Montana entries and three Alberta quintets.

Hamilton said he was surprised at the Canadians' wide-open, speedy style of play.

"These Canadians are tall, big and fast, and they're now getting training as good as the boys in the states," he said.

Canadian teams in the International league have averaged 65 points a game, which is "tops in any company," according to Hamilton.

"We've won more than our share against the visiting American teams," he added.

Oregon State Buries Idaho Score, 51-39

Last night the Vandals lost their fourth conference game of the year against no wins. Victors were the Oregon State Beavers by a 51-39 count.

The win gave the Beavers an even break on their invasion of the Palouse country. Oregon State whipped Idaho twice but lost a pair to Washington State.

Alert Ball Handling
Last night's game, the only one in the conference, was highlighted by alert ballhandling on the part of Oregon State.

Idaho gave a good account of itself for the first eight minutes, holding the Beavers even. Then a goal by Jim Nau gave OSC a 7-5 lead which they never relinquished.

Jim Padgett led Oregon State with 14 points and Bob Wheeler had 11 for Idaho.

Elk Hunters Fail To Report Cards
Less than half of the hunters who purchased elk tags for last season have mailed in their reports to the game commission, it was announced today by C. A. Lockwood, state game director.

Lockwood pointed out that these reports are required by law and are also of vital necessity for the proper management of our big game herds.

Of the 16,980 elk hunters reporting so far, 7,257 have reported making kills and 9,104 said they were unsuccessful. The remaining 619 reported they did not hunt.

If the return report card has been lost or mislaid, a letter will do, he said. The letter should be addressed to the Oregon state game commission, at Portland, and should include the following information:

If a hunt was made or not, if a kill was made or not and if a kill was made the approximate location of the kill and the approximate age of the kill.

Belmont Stakes Entry List for 1950 Named; Includes Best Horses
New York, Jan. 25.—(U.P.)—Nominations for the 1950 running of the \$75,000 Belmont stakes were closed today with 102 three-year-olds eligible for the classic mile and a half and almost every outstanding juvenile of 1949 was among them.

The list announced yesterday by the Westchester Racing association included King Ranch's Middleground, generally regarded as the best two-year-old colt last season; A. G. Vanderbilt's Bed o' Roses, a standout among the juvenile fillies; and William Goetz' Your Host, the outstanding horse developed during the winter season thus far.

Maxim Says Part 'Heavy' Titleholder

London, Jan. 25.—(U.P.)—Joey Maxim, Cleveland's explosive "cream puff" who wrested the world light heavyweight championship from English Freddie Mills last night, announced today he was additionally claiming part of the heavyweight crown.

Although a notoriously light puncher, Maxim not only knocked out Mills at 1:54 of the 10th round but he stiffened him for nearly 10 minutes, stunning a record indoor British crowd of more than 20,000 in Earl's court.

Manager Jack Kearns explained that his stream-lined, black-haired Ohio champion would remain in London "for a spell" and claim the "white heavyweight" championship of the world.

Kearns, who managed Jack Dempsey in his prime, said Promoter Jack Solomons probably would let Maxim defend his "white heavyweight" claims against the winner of a May bout in London between British Bruce Woodcock and Lee Savold of Paterson, N. J.

Kearns emphasized: The U. S. national boxing association awarded its portion of the heavyweight championship to Ezzard Charles, whom Maxim has beaten in two of three bouts.

Veteran Mills has a contract for a return title bout with Maxim within 90 days; but Manager Ted Broadbribb said today he and Mills would not ask for a return bout. If 30-year-old Mills couldn't beat 27-year-old Maxim last night, he'll never be able to.

Chicago Ball Player 'Grim'

New York, Jan. 25.—(U.P.)—Cash-and-Carry Cass Michaels, the Chicago White Sox' all-star second baseman, hung on grimly today as the most stubborn holdout in baseball.

Four times since early January the Detroit has received a contract from the Sox, and four times he has sent it back with verbose verbiage freely translated into the one word, "No."

Club General Manager Frank Lane said Michaels will not get the chance to send a fifth refusal.

Intimating that Michaels wants all the cash he can carry, the club spokesman related events this way:

"The first contract we sent was about \$5,000 off what Michaels thinks he should get. Each time we sent him a new contract we upped our offer. Now I'm going to sit back and rest a while."

Varsity basketball games on Thursday at 4:15 p.m. will find Jackson playing at Roosevelt and Lincoln at Washington.

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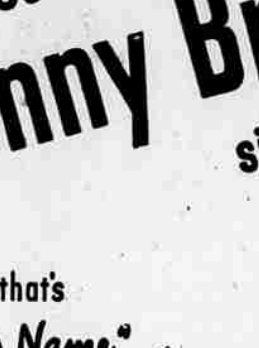


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
