There are three inches of new powder snow on top of a total snow pack of 114 inches at Crater Lake National park, it was learned here today. Radio reports said the total season's snowfall to date is 251 inches.

The maximum temperature at the park in the past 24 hours was nine degrees and the minimum was four degrees. At 10:30 a.m. today the sky was overcast and it was snowing lightly.

Both the south and west entrance roads to the park are open but chains are required; it was reported. The rim road is closed.

Bangor, Me. (U.P.)—On his day off, fireman Dennis Givren, 62, rescued four children from a burning house.

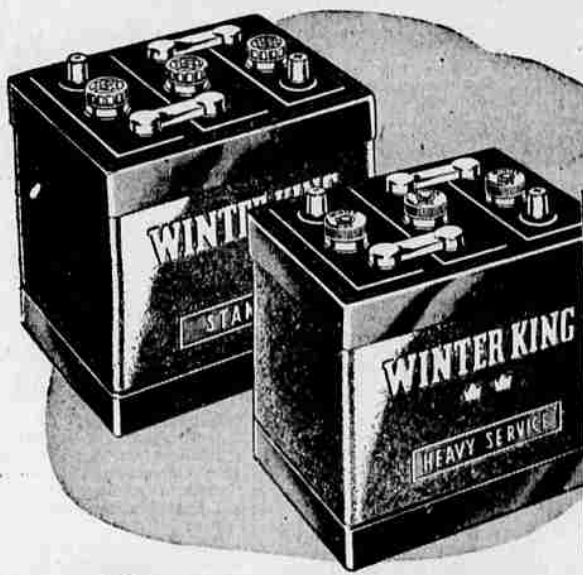
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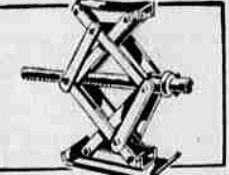

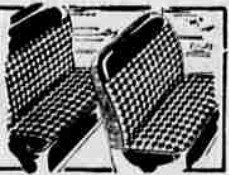
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
