

Goodrich Introduces Tubeless Car Tire

Detroit, Jan. 25.—(U.P.)—B. F. Goodrich company today introduced a puncture-proof tubeless tire reported resistant to nails and high-speed swerving.

The tread is made of a new tough, long-wearing "cold rubber." Air is retained in the tire instead of in an inner tube, Goodrich said. Guy Gundaker Jr., general manager of replacement tire sales said the internal structure of the tube is new, although the tubeless casing looks no different than an ordinary tire when on a car.

The tire has a special first ply, providing a thin-effective barrier against air diffusion. A thick layer of special puncture-resistant material covers the crown and shoulder of the casing, and provides protection against punctures by nails or spikes that ordinarily cause flats.

The new tire costs less than a standard tire and safety tube, but a little more than a standard tire and conventional tube, he said.

26 Escape Injury In Plane's Belly Landing

Chicago, Jan. 26.—(U.P.)—A non-scheduled airliner carrying 26 persons made a successful belly landing by skidding nearly 1,000 feet on muddy ground at Midway airport today after the ship's wheel mechanism failed.

The 23 passengers, including a four-year-old boy, and the crew of three escaped injury. The plane, operated by the Arrow Lines, was en route from New York City to California.

Damage to the plane was estimated at \$2,000. Most of the damage was on the wings.

Science at Work

Engineer Offers Advice on How to Drive Auto Over Icy Roads—Keeping at Low Speed Suggested

New York, Jan. 25.—(U.P.)—So you think you know how to drive your car over icy pavements? If not, here are some tips from a University of Wisconsin engineer:

First, on the matter of "stepping on the gas."
1—Treat the accelerator pedal as carefully as you do the brake pedal. Sudden release of the accelerator may be as disastrous as sudden application of power.
2—If the rear wheels do begin to spin, release the accelerator pedal, but not too suddenly, until the wheels regain traction.

The words of advice come from Archie H. Easton of the university's college of engineering. His findings are based on results of a series of exhaustive tests run at different times last winter on Wisconsin roads.

Reduced Speed Necessary
Easton says that when driving on an icy highway, motorists should drive at a speed which is well below the maximum attainable under the conditions.

"That is just plain common sense," he said.
He also warned that if the road is crowded, rough, or there is a side wind, motorists should be careful not to apply excess power.

Easton reported that the tests also shows that turning the front wheels in the direction of the skid will aid in regaining control unless, of course, the skid has gone too far. The one thing to remember, he said, is take your foot off the gas slowly and carefully when the rear wheels begin to skid on slippery pavement. That helps the wheels regain traction.

Expert Can Get Into Trouble
Easton gave a warning to all drivers that once a vehicle is in a bad skid or a flat spin, there is little that can be done to recover even by an expert test driver.

On the manner of braking, he recalled that the stopping distance from a given speed on ice is as much as 12 times greater than that on bare pavement and that a driver must anticipate stops.

Should an emergency arise, he advised, pumping or fanning the brakes instead of "freezing" the pedal will help to meet it. The method, he said, requires practice to become effective. It consists of rapidly applying and

Alexandria, Va., Jan. 25.—(U.P.)—A three-man sanity commission will decide whether a 39-year-old Ft. Belvoir civilian engineer is capable of standing trial for the shooting of his three children.

The commission was named yesterday.

The state charges John S. Conner with killing Cecelia, five, Michael, eight, and Stephanie, 11, on December 7 as they screamed for mercy.

He told police he shot them so they wouldn't grow up to suffer from mental conflicts like he did. At a preliminary hearing December 23, he pleaded not guilty by reason of insanity.

John S. Conner, charged with killing his three children in Alexandria, Va., on December 7, formerly resided in Medford. Mrs. Conner also is a former Medford resident.

Nation Ended 1949 In Fine Financial Shape

Washington, Jan. 25.—(U.P.)—The government reported today that the nation ended 1949 in fine economic shape—although not quite as good as 1948.

It said the average weekly factory wages last month rose to an all-time high of \$56.20. Factory employment increased 1,000,000 workers to a 1949 high of 43,700,000 during the month and an eight per cent boost in construction pushed the 1949 level of home building to a new record, it said.

Athens, Ala., Jan. 25.—(U.P.)—A 150-pound man and his 350-pound companion allegedly enlisted to help steal an eight-ton steel bridge were resting up in the pokey today.

The \$25,000 Piney Creek bridge which first was missed when a motorist found water—not steel—staring at his bumper was located in two junkyards yesterday and on its way back to Piney Creek for reassembly.

Sheriff John Sandlin said the original bolts apparently intruded Fred Vickers, 30, the 150-pounder. Realizing that he was far too slight to attempt the elephantine task alone, he called in 350-pound Woodrow Moore, 35, Sandlin said.

Then, said the sheriff, they took it apart, hauled its sections to Sheffield and Huntsville and sold it at a cent a pound. They made \$149.

115-Pound Girl Hurt When Lifting Auto

Raymondville, Tex., Jan. 25.—(U.P.)—A Raymondville hospital today treated a 115-pound farm girl for internal injuries suffered when she lifted an automobile which had pinned down her brother.

Guadalupe Salazar, 19, told hospital attendants that she lifted the rear end of the car for 20 seconds while her brother crawled out uninjured.

She said the automobile fell on her brother when it slipped off a jack.

Driving Sans Lights In Daylight Brings

Lyman, Wyo., Jan. 25.—(U.P.)—Charged with driving without lights in broad daylight, more than 200 Wyoming motorists were "fined" \$1 apiece by Lions' club judges collecting funds for the March of Dimes.

State patrolmen and other club members "arrested" drivers on U. S. highway 30, then brought them into court.

Nearly all paid their fines without protest, and the polo fund netted \$282.
