Scout Volunteers Honored At Recognition Luncheon

Awards were presented, leaders and other volunteers introduced and honored and 1950 board officers and chairmen installed at the annual recognition meeting of the Medford district of Girl Scouts held Tuesday noon at the Rogue Valley Country club. Mrs. Allan F. Perry, retiring board chairman and Mrs. Eugene Peterson, incoming chairman, conducted the meeting.

Mrs. Scott Davis was presented a special award for outstanding service to the Girl Scout movement in this district, and Mrs. W. H. Reichstein was presented a special award from members of her troop six.

Mrs. Davis served as council commissioner for the district for two years, was a member of the established camp committee which selected the site of Low Echo, and worked with the group which helped to raise money for the camp. Mrs. Davis has also been a chairman of the nominating membership committee of the district board, has served two years as committee woman for region, and is now vice president of the area board and chairman of the staff and office committee of the board. In addition she represents the Girl Scouts on the Community Chest board.

Mrs. Reichstein's award was presented by Carol Pence, a member of her troop, who explained that Mrs. Reichstein has served as leader of the same group since the girls entered as Brownies, and has been a particularly outstanding leader. Mrs. Reichstein is now in the sixth year of leadership for the troop.

Mrs. O. H. Bengtson was honored for 13 years of volunteer work with Girl Scouts. Mrs. C. A. Thatcher for 13 years. Mrs. M. N. Hogan, Medford chairman and now area president, for 11 years. Mrs. John S. Day for eight years and Mrs. Davis, Mrs. Rollin Jones and Mrs. G. M. Cannon for seven years. Several women whose names were previously announced, were given awards for five years or more of service. At the opening of the meeting Mrs. Peterson introduced the neighborhood chairmen who in turn introduced the members of their committees. Mrs. Peterson also presented Mrs. Perry with an orchid in appreciation of her service as board chairman.

Main speaker for the meeting, attended by about 125 women, was Mrs. Hogan, who was presented an orchid as she was introduced. Mrs. Hogan gave highlights of the national Girl Scout convention, held in Milwaukee in November, and her talk was accompanied by slides, shown by Mrs. Hopkins, who also attended the convention.

Over 6000 delegates attended the convention from the United States, Alaska and Guam, she stated, and added that the Girl Scout program has been revived in Japan and has been established in Alaska by Mrs. Marjorie Kafer, former community advisor on the national staff for this district.

One of the features of the convention was a pageant, based on events in the life of Juliette Low, Mrs. Hogan reported, and present at the convention was a niece of Mrs. Low and the first scout. Mrs. Hogan explained the organization of Girl Scouts from the local district through area, section and regions to the national board and pointed out that any worker can make suggestions which will be channeled to the national board.

Mrs. Hogan quoted Margaret Culkin Banning, convention speaker, who had said the United States is a "state of welfare" while Russia and some other countries are "welfare states." Mrs. Banning further said the United States is almost the only nation permitted "freedom of giving which permits volunteer service to the youth of the country; freedom to perpetuate the

Dime Card Donations Help Polio Campaign

While the figure is no true measure of the success so far of the March of Dimes drive, a total of \$1,380.00 had been turned in to Treasurer Elwood Hedberg up to yesterday, he said this morning. Most of it represented donations mailed in the "dime cards" recently distributed.

The job of counting the coins has been a big one, handled by P. J. Wright and Charlie H. McKee, Hedberg said, and many of the contributions have been in the form of coins. Many of the cards also contain money of higher denominations, with bills and checks ranging from \$5 to \$50.

Weather Hinders
As the fund drive for the local chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis nears the end of its second week, reports from the state board of health revealed that severe winter weather was handicapping the 1950 drive, as it did last year. Dr. E. T. Hedlund, state chairman of the campaign, said that it seems probable that the drive, originally scheduled to close January 31, "might have to be extended in several communities." He said that public response to the "most vital March of Dimes in history is good," but he pointed out that cold and heavy snow have retarded the tempo of the campaign.

Dr. Samuel Osgood, state epidemiologist, said in Portland today that the dreaded bulbar type polio hit an estimated 25 per cent of Oregon's infantile paralysis victims in 1949. Reports on 201 of the state's 324 cases last year showed that 54 of those tabulated were of the lethal bulbar type.

Fatalities Down
Dr. Osgood's final report for 1949 characterized 1949's case-fatality rate of 6.8 per cent as "slightly below" the Oregon median of about 8 per cent. Age grouping of polio victims, reported by the state physician, showed that younger people are still the greatest sufferers from infantile paralysis. The following division of cases by age was shown:

Under 5 years, 20 per cent; 5 to 9 years, 25 per cent; 10 to 14 years, 15 per cent; 15 to 19 years, 8 per cent; 20 to 24 years, 5 per cent; 25 to 29 years, 12 per cent; 30 to 34 years, 8 per cent; over 35 years, 4½ per cent, and unclassified, 1¼ per cent.

Other Events
Among the events marking the March of Dimes drive this week are the dance to be sponsored by the American Legion at the Medford armory tomorrow evening, and dances Saturday at the Gold Hill Grange hall, sponsored by the Grange, and at the Elks club in Medford.

According to Glenn Chase, promotion chairman for the Grange, the group will gladly donate their building and staff for the second annual such dance, which will be from 9 p. m. to 1 a. m.

Grange spokesmen said that it is hoped a record crowd will make use of the facilities and enjoy a full evening of dancing and entertainment. Home made pies and sandwiches, soft drinks and coffee will be served continuously during the evening.
