Class B High School Games Slated Friday

While both Butte Falls and Rogue River, the only undefeated B school quintets in the county, will be favored to win over Gold Hill and Prospect, respectively, neither is likely to win by an easy means. This applies especially to Butte Falls.

Grid, Basketball Clinic Scheduled

Eugene, Jan. 26—Dates have been set for the annual summer football clinic held by the University of Oregon summer session.

The combined clinic will open on July 10 and close July 21. One week of the football work will be conducted by Jim Aiken, Oregon's head coach, and the other by a guest coach. The same system will be applied to basketball and Oregon's John Warren will split the two weeks period with another visiting coach.

Dean Jacobson said the visiting coaches would be announced later. In the past Stu Holcomb and Wally Butts of Georgia have handled football and Vadal Peterson of Utah and Gordon Ridings of Columbia were in charge of basketball.
