Ordinance Would Alter Start Of Daylight Time

Portland, Ore., Jan. 27—(U.P.) The Portland city council today ordered the city attorney to draw up an ordinance changing effective date of daylight saving time for 1950 from April 23 to April 30.

The council said airlines had requested the change to coincide with opening of daylight saving time in eastern states.

If the new ordinance is accepted, Portland daylight saving time will begin at 2 a.m. Sunday, April 30, and end at 1:59 a.m. September 24.
