Japan As Tourist Haven Aim Of Group

Tokyo, Jan. 27.—(U.P.)—A group of American investors signed a contract today to spend \$100,000,000 in Japan in hopes of turning it into a great tourist attraction.

The contract calls for American engineers to take part in the program. It also will help develop Japan's hydroelectric power and transportation.

Premier Shigeru Yoshida said the contract "heralds a new epoch of active American participation in Japan's national reconstruction."

"It is a heartening proof of American confidence in the future of Japan," he said.

Koreans Protest Halt To Flow Of ECA Aid

Seoul, Korea, Jan. 27.—(U.P.)—An estimated 6,000 to 7,000 Korean trade unioners and students filled Seoul streets in a protest demonstration against stoppage of ECA aid to their country. Carrying banners asking "Continue U. S. Korean aid to eliminate communism in the far east," the demonstrators marched through the city, finally massing in Uchi road in front of the U. S. embassy building which houses both the state department offices and those of the ECA mission in Korea.

There they led a series of college type cheers asking that the aid be continued.
