**Raiders To Play Chico
Tonight And Saturday**

Ashland, Jan. 27—Chico State's high scoring basketball squad and league-leading Southern Oregon college will square off tonight and Saturday in Ashland for a bid for the Far West conference title.

The Red Raiders, unbeaten in conference play, had a rugged time last weekend with Humboldt State, having to beat them 68-64 in the first game in overtime and narrowly edging by in the second contest, after the Lumberjacks had closed the gap to two points.

Raiders Win Four
Having previously dropped San Francisco State twice, the Raiders have posted four wins in the loop.

The Cats, in the meantime, lashed out against a valiant San Francisco five to up their loop record to five wins and one loss, at the hands of the strong Cal Aggies outfit.

Chico showed a great effort in their last four contests, thrashed Humboldt and San Francisco and then coming from behind to crush a do-or-die Gator five. They have had a much rougher season to date than the Red Raiders, who are just hitting the tough end of their schedule now.

Raiders Hurt In 1949
It was the Ashland squad that kept the Wildcats from a perfect conference record last year, dropped the Maxeymen twice in the early part of the season before the great Chico team began to roll and the locals will be out to even the count as well as for the loop lead.

Ready for the major circuit clash will be the conference's three leading scorers, Chico's Vere Butler, Lyle Olsen and Jatter Cowan, all of whom have scored well over the 200 point marker. Olsen provided a great defensive play against the Gators with his backboard play.

Backing up the front line are vastly improved and steady Joe Rukavina and Ellis Rolls, who is rounding into form after joining the squad in mid-season.

Hale Leading

Cage Scorer
Lloyd Hale of Eagle Point and Jack Morris of Medford are pacing the individual scoring for the Southern Oregon conference-district 4 race according to unofficial figures announced today in Ashland.

The Eagles forward has scored 24 points for an average of 12 per game, compared to a total of 46 for Morris in four games and an average of 11.5.

Next to this pair are Vern Craft of Grants Pass with 34 points in three games, Bill Toole (Klamath) with 44 in four, Pat Simmons (Eagle Point) with 21 in two, Pat Ford (Grants Pass) with 31 in three and Dick Smith (Ashland) with 39 in four played.

Bob Shores is next to Morris in the Medford scoring pace with 37 points in four games for a 9.3 average. Bob Doherty of the Eagles has tallied 15 in two, Herb Collier (Central Point) 30 in four and Herb Trautman (Central Point) 28 in four.
