Actions Of Girl After Shooting Of Father Described

Bridgeport, Conn., Jan. 27 — (U.P.) — Four horsemen of light-pity, sympathy, love and mercy rode today with a slim, blonde girl in her battle against the state of Connecticut.

The girl was Carol Ann Paigh, 21, who so loved her father that when he cried out in the pain of an incurable cancer she sent him to what she considered a merciful death with one shot from his revolver.

Face Sickly White

Three state witnesses testified in her murder trial yesterday that just after the shooting they saw her leaning against a hospital corridor wall, her face a sickly white. But they said she was cool and calm.

One witness, a doctor, said she talked "perfectly sanely." Another, a detective, said she told him that before the shooting she went deliberately into the woods near the hospital and fired a practice shot with her policeman father's .38 service revolver "so I would know what I was doing."

The defense pleaded temporary insanity, saying she was driven out of her mind for a time by grief and pity and love. But Detective Capt. William J. Lynch of Stamford, Conn., testified that at 8:30 p. m. last September 23, 2 hours and 40 minutes after she had put a bullet through the brain of Police Sgt. Carl W. Paigh, 52, Carol told him rationally why she had acted.

Malice Charged

"She said she had shot her father and she didn't care what people thought or what they did to her but she wouldn't see him suffer," Lynch said.

The state charges Carol acted deliberately, "with malice aforethought." Because that is a crime against the state, she is charged with murder in the second degree. If found guilty, she will be sentenced automatically to life imprisonment.

Robinson Opposes CVA; Lesseg To Head Young GOP

Warren G. Lesseg, Medford attorney, was elected president of the Jackson County Young Republican club at the club's annual meeting last night at Valentine's cafe. He succeeds Paul Haviland and will serve for two years. Haviland was named a director.

Fred E. Robinson, Medford, republican candidate for United States senator, addressed the group and answered questions. He favored development of the Columbia river basin but not by a "dictator" program.

Opposes CVA

He indicated the opinion that the present Columbia Valley authority proposal is that type of program, and added that he feared CVA as a tool to break up private enterprise. "We don't want to set up a political regime," he declared, adding that the people through their representatives may be unable to get the power back once it is delegated to the proposed three-man board.

Regarding fair employment practices legislation, Robinson stated that he felt there should be no discrimination in employment to race, color, creed. He said that an FEP commission could be all right if administered as it should be as an absolutely true and functional board representing the groups involved, labor, management and the public.

Against Reapportionment

The young republicans at the session took the stand that the present system of apportionment for the legislature is more adequate for the state's needs than the current plan advocated for reapportionment.

Other new officers are Mrs. K. Landrau, Medford, vice president; Mrs. Marion Langley, Medford, secretary-treasurer; and Earl Schilling, Ashland, director. All new officers were elected on unanimous ballots.

Reminder Issued On New Garbage Rates

City Sanitary Service company reminded householders today of the residential garbage collection rates that will go into effect on Wednesday, February 1.

The monthly rate for twice a week service will be \$1.25 for one can not to exceed 30 gallons. For each additional can the charge will be \$1, provided the cans are picked up at the same location. An extra 50 cents will be assessed for each can if it must be carried up or down a flight of stairs.

All trash must be in cans only. Rates, company officials said, will be set according to the number of cans now being used unless the resident is otherwise notified.

The firm's charge for collection has been by the household.
