Visit Of Indians Highlights Week; Ski Party Returns

By far the most interesting visitors which Medford has had in a long time were the two speakers for the Kline and Fork club Monday evening at the Country club, Krishna Nehru, whose noted brother is prime minister of India, and her husband, Raja Hutheesing.

Both were in native costume, and while there could be some doubt as to whether one would want American men to adopt the costume worn by Raja Hutheesing, many women in the club audience would gladly have traded almost anything in their wardrobe for the sari which Mrs. Hutheesing wore. It was of gorgeous silk in shades of aquamarine blue, gold and rust. Looking at the intricate folds and draperies, the feminine members of the audience wondered how it was done and could hardly believe that the dress was all one piece, five yards in length, and the skirt, blouse-effect and draperies all a matter of the proper winding. The wearer confessed that she had been giving away saris at almost every stopping place on the tour with the result that she had reached the point where she could part with no more.

Mrs. Hutheesing's jewelry, heavy dark silver with blue-green stones, also drew many envious glances and the effect was heightened by the dot in the middle of her forehead between her eyes. Having always believed this to be a "caste mark" it was astonishing to hear the Indian speaker say this is but a beauty mark, worn by some and ignored by other women of India.

She explained that the caste system, not originally an Indian custom, was begun by Aryan conquerors in an effort to prevent the people of the conquering country from intermarrying with natives of India and that the highest caste, Brahmin (to which the Nehrus belong) is still almost pure Aryan. Raja Hutheesing is of the third caste, business men and bankers, she explained, and added that since in the olden days it was forbidden to marry out of one's caste, in the eyes of some she and her husband "are living in sin."

Raja Hutheesing said he was so taken with this section of Oregon, since it is much like the part of India in which he lives, that he even inquired the price of land! Mr. Hutheesing, an editor, pleased the newspaper people in his audience by saying more people are educated through the efforts of journalists than through the efforts of universities.

Like so many who are fired with a cause, Mr. Hutheesing was so eager, even desperate, to make his listeners understand his ideas that some thought he spoke overlong. Others, however, would gladly have listened another half hour or so and many hurried to the speaker's platform to meet the Hutheesings and to ask questions.

It was at this time that Mrs. Wallace Haskins, Mrs. Ivah Murray and Mrs. Richard Werner talked to Mrs. Hutheesing about education in her native land. They learned that to further education of the masses, each university student in India is now required to teach part of every day and each student, before he can be graduated, must show that he has helped to teach at least two adults to read and write. The speaker also said that India has many school buses, just like America, and that pupils are picked up at their doors. The school day is somewhat longer than here with two one-hour recesses.

The Hutheesings' two sons are now in school in Michigan, and the mother was without a speech manuscript, the elder son having borrowed it to help with a speech he was making soon. His first since arriving in this country, Mrs. Hutheesing said that in past years they had both been avid readers of American comic books, a fact which brought groans from her listeners who hastened to assure her that they were not representative of this country—or were they?

The speakers were guests in the home of the Leonard Carpenters while here, with the Dunbar Carpenters playing hosts in the absence of the former. Mrs. Dunbar Carpenter, looking particularly stunning in a black evening gown, made a good foil for Mrs. Hutheesing.

The speakers went from here to Twin Falls, Ida., and then planned to go to Sun Valley for a week's rest at the famous resort.

Says Child Musicians Impose On Audiences

Boston (U.P.)—Child prodigies are "mistakes," says Jules Wolfers, Boston University music professor, who was one himself. Wolfers made his first appearance as a piano soloist with London's Hammersmith Symphony orchestra at the age of 9.

A child of that age, he says now, "is not mature enough to have the feeling and creative sense that goes with the adult specialist."

"In judging his ability," Wolfers says, "this is often taken into consideration and concessions are made. For this reason it is a bad thing for the child and not fair to the public."
