Your Child's Teeth

Following is third in a series of question and answer articles submitted by the Southern Oregon Dental society, in observance of National Children's Dental Health day, Monday, February 6.

When should a child pay his first visit to the dentist?

Generally speaking, a child should be taken to the dentist when all twenty primary teeth have erupted, which is usually between the ages of two and three years.

Should this be done even though the child has no apparent dental trouble?

Yes. There are several good

reasons for this procedure. One is that such a visit will cause the child no discomfort or pain and thus he will not be so likely to develop that dread of "going to the dentist" which has been one of the great promoters of dental disease in the past. Another reason is that the child will early acquire an appreciation of the value of proper dental health habits.

Should a child visit the dentist at regular and frequent intervals?

Yes, because such regular visits at frequent intervals enable the dentist to discover any new cavities or other defects in their early stages when correction can most easily be made. Early treatment not only spares the patient much pain but may avert serious complications and possible loss of teeth.

How often should a child visit the dentist?

No hard and fast rule can be laid down regarding the frequency of a child's dental visits. In children as in adults there is great variation in the degree of susceptibility to tooth decay and other forms of dental disease. As a rule the child's dental visits should be made at least every six months unless otherwise recommended by the dentist.

How can a child best be prepared for his first visit to the dentist?

One of the finest contributions a parent can make to his child's dental health is to prevent him from developing a fear of the dentist. If the parents show a sensible attitude towards dentistry, speaking in a casual, matter-of-fact way about health benefits it confers, the child in all likelihood will adopt a similar attitude and will thus avoid the feeling of dread that makes an ordeal of the visit to the dentist.
