Senior High Gym Scene of Cage Clash

Harlem Globetrotters, nationwide famous comedy basketball team and considered tops in the nation for good basketball as well, will play an AAU league all-star team Thursday at 8 p.m. in the senior high gym under sponsorship of Rogue Valley Baseball, Inc.

A prelin at 6:30 p.m. will send two AAU league teams against each other when town teams of Talent and Phoenix clash.

Facing the famous Negro quintet will be an all-star team that not only has a high-scoring record for the year individually but many of whom are on Green's confectionery AAU league quintet that had averaged 73 points per game up to its recent loss to Prospect.

High Scoring Team
Snuffy Smith has averaged 14. Barney Riggs 12, Tex Gatlin 16 and M. O. Busack 12 for the confectionerymen and all of these plus Chuck Jandreau of the same quintet, six or eight others will be seen in action tomorrow evening.

Proceeds from the game will go toward helping finance the Medford Nuggets baseball club this coming season and helping the AAU basketball league finances.

Tickets for the game are on sale at several stores in Medford including Lamport's Sporting Goods store, Groceries and Weeks and Orr Furniture. Fans need not buy the tickets in advance as they will be on sale at the door.

Referees tomorrow night will be Virgil Swanson of Medford and Ted Schopf, Ashland.

The Globetrotters come here after a tour in California and Oregon in which they have won all their games but equally as important they provide topnotch basketball with a brand of comedy that keeps every fan interested from start to the closing whistle.

No reserved seats are on sale for the game but fans will come on a first come, first served basis. Children's prices are lower than those for adults.

Pirates Pay \$100,000 to Ballplayer

Los Angeles, Jan. 31—(U.P.)—The most unusual deal in baseball history brought Paul Pettit, an untouted rookie left-hander who pitched six no-hit games for his high school team, into the Pittsburgh Pirates farm system today for a record bonus of around \$100,000.

"Our scouts think he will be an outstanding major league pitcher," said Roy Haney, the Pirates' general manager.

"He certainly should be, for that kind of money."

Pettit, a 6-foot 2-inch youngster of 18 who graduated from Narbonne high school at Lomita, Cal., last week, will report to New Orleans March 1 for a year's seasoning with the Pirates' Southern association farm team.

The contract that makes him organized baseball's highest-priced rookie was signed late yesterday in the office of Al Blum, business manager for Frederick Stephani, motion picture writer and producer who set up the transaction when he signed Pettit to an exclusive contract while the boy was still in high school.

The rules of organized baseball forbid any club to approach a prospective player until 24 hours after he graduates from high school. But Stephani was not bound by such rules.

Tomjack Basket Gives Crusaders 47 to 45 Victory

Ben Tomjack's lay-in shot in a sudden death overtime period last night gave St. Mary's high school its first county B conference basketball victory of the season, a 47 to 45 win over Prospect high on the local parochial floor.

The score of the regular game was tied at 41 to 41 when the final gun sounded and the two quintets already had played one overtime when Tomjack dribbled in for his shot. He fouled on the play but a Prospect free throw failed.

Crusaders in Lead
St. Mary's led most of the way, including 14 to 12 at the first quarter, 22 to 17 at the half and 31 to 28 at the third quarter whistle pause.

Driscoll and Tomjack with 12 points and Long who dumped in nine led the Crusaders, while Linderman got 14, Note nine and Campbell six to lead the Prospect team.

In the prelim the Prospect junior varsity defeated St. Mary's jayvees 38 to 28.

Medford junior high basketball teams came through with victories last night at the local gym and for awhile it looked as if they would be just as one-sided over Ashland junior high as the last time until Ashland's ninth graders started to hit their stride in the finale.

The local seventh grade quintet started off the evening by walloping the Ashland seventh graders 45 to 7 in the girls' gym while the Bulldog eighth grade five was gaining a 30 to 10 decision in the new gymnasium. Medford's varsity won 55 to 29.

Ashland Starts Score
The local varsity or ninth grade team had things pretty much its own way in the second game in the new gym until Ashland started to get through the Bulldog defense, rather in many rebounds and hit the hoop from outside the keyhole with ease.

While the final result was never in doubt even during this rush by the junior Grizzlies, Medford had some anxious moments. Coach Mel Boldenow of the varsity inserted many subs in the second half and against these much of the Ashland rally was made.

As a matter of fact Coaches Niles Smith of the local seventh graders and Chief McLean of the Bulldog eighth graders substituted freely and this helped keep the scores down.

Seventh Graders Lead
The seventh graders from Medford led 11 to 3 at the first period, 25 to 3 at the half, 29 to 6 at the third quarter and 37 to 6 at the automatic timeout.

Medford's eighth grade quintet was ahead 8 to 0 at the first quarter, 13 to 6 at the half, 21 to 6 at the third quarter and 26 to 8 at the automatic timeout.

The local varsity held a 12 to 4 first period lead, 30 to 8 at the half, 46 to 23 at the third quarter and 50 to 26 at the automatic timeout.

However, SOC is not noted for laying down on any athletic job.

Negro Rated High
John Fisher, 125, is expected to go places in national intercollegiate boxing this year when the U.S. matches are held out here on the coast. This Negro already has shone in last year's matches and has continued this year with victories.

Last year the San Francisco Staters won 141 matches and although most of this year's team is made up of sophomores, the youths coached by Ward Carr are rated tops.

Others considered outstanding for the Staters in addition to Fisher are Ted Abbott at 145 pounds, Tony Jerong at 130 and Jim Hughes, 145.

Fighting tomorrow night for SOC will be Bill Boyer (130), Dalton James (135), Burt Skinner (145), Paul Sherrier (155), Ken Lindley of Medford (165), Louis Maurer (175) and Harry Reiton (heavyweight). The 125-pound fighter was not known definitely today.

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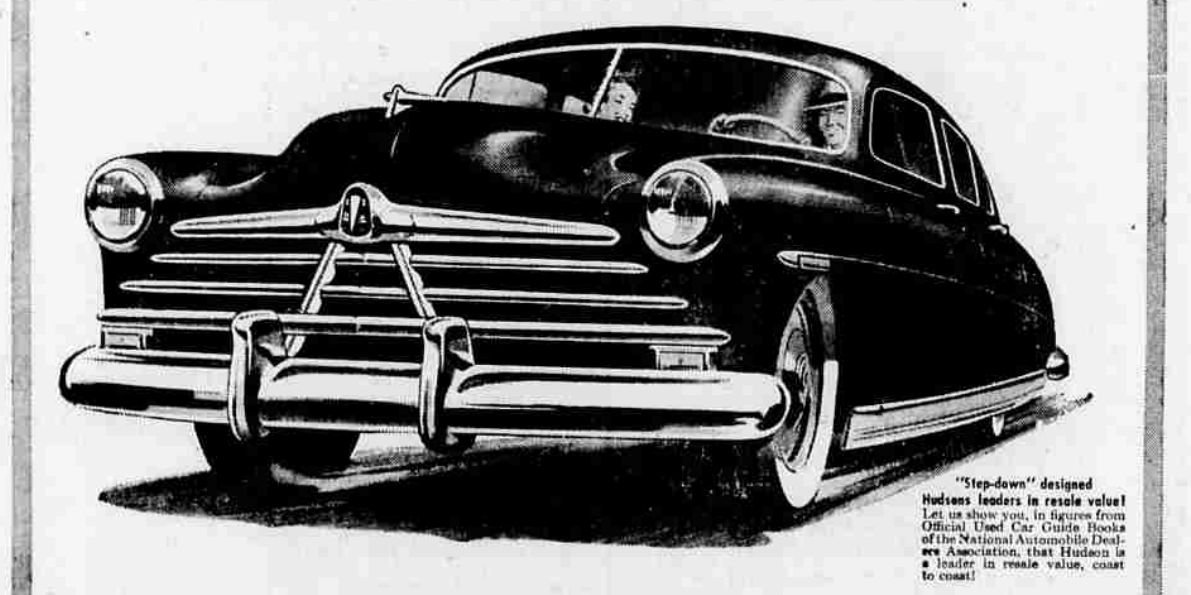
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
