Chrysler Walkout Enters Second Week

Detroit, Mich., Feb. 1.—(U.P.)—The Chrysler strike entered its second week today with no sign that either side was ready to compromise on its contract demands.

High officials of the CIO United Auto Workers and Chrysler corporation refused to comment on the walkout which has idled a total of 120,000 workers.

Federal and state labor mediators said they would not schedule resumption of negotiations until one side offers a compromise.

The UAW called a walkout of 89,000 production workers in 25 Chrysler plants in six states a week ago this morning when the world's third-ranking automaker refused its demand for a 10-cent package increase.

The union, after rejecting Chrysler's offer of \$100 monthly pensions for 65-year-old workers with 25 years' service, said it would accept the 10-cent boost as either a combination pension-insurance plan or a wage increase.

Heart Association Opens Fund Drive
New York, Feb. 1.—(U.P.)—The American Heart association opened its 1950 drive today, seeking to raise \$6,000,000 for a continuing attack on heart disease, the nation's No. 1 killer.

Spokesmen for the association said that most of the cash raised will be retained by the local communities to conduct an educational campaign, giving the public facts about heart disease, and coordinating various community services—medical, nursing, welfare and others—into integrated heart programs serving the public.

A large share of the "war chest" also will be used to finance research projects into the causes of rheumatic fever, high blood pressure and hardening of the arteries, which account for 90 per cent of all heart diseases.
