

Grants Pass Gets Western Oregon Livestock Parley

Corvallis, Ore., Feb. 2.—(U.P.)—Grants Pass will be the site of next year's 15th annual convention for delegates of the western Oregon livestock association.

At yesterday's concluding meeting here, about 100 delegates picked the site and also named Lauren T. Woody of Grants Pass the new association president for the year. Woody, operator of the River Banks farm at Grants Pass, succeeds Charles A. Evans of Independence.

Lindgren Relected

Archie A. Rieckold will be the new vice president, and Harry A. Lindgren, Oregon State college animal husbandry specialist, was reelected secretary-treasurer.

At the same time, the association adopted a slate of 19 resolutions including one calling for passage of a general Oregon sales tax with proceeds going to help support public educational institutions and thus lower real and property taxes.

Other Resolutions

Other resolutions passed included:

1. Indorsement of rigid meat inspection as a safeguard to the health of the general public with a warning that meat inspection should not be confused with meat grading. The association said it favored a voluntary system of meat grading.

2. Approved setting up a clinical diagnostic laboratory in Salem or Corvallis for the use of local and county veterinarians and other men connected with the livestock industry.

3. Asked that raccoons and skunks be put on the predatory animal list.

Father-Son Hobby Club Slates Meeting Today

Hal Carver, photography; Don Darnelle and Jim Shinn, wire tape and recording; and Darrel Davis will offer an electronics display.

Only boys accompanied by their fathers, uncle, older brother, or the man next door will be admitted, according to Linn. Refreshments will be served.

Navy Holds Comment On Mothballing Big Mo

Washington, Feb. 2.—(U.P.)—Secretary of the Navy Francis P. Matthews said today the navy would have no comment on a proposal to put the re-floated battleship Missouri in both halves.

The proposal was made yesterday by Chairman Carl Vinson, (D., Ga.) of the house armed services committee. Vinson said the navy should commission an extra aircraft carrier instead.

Guaranteed Rainmaker Shipped To New York

Juneau, Alaska, Feb. 2.—(U.P.)—A thunderbird totem pole, guaranteed by southwestern Alaska natives to bring rain, was being shipped to New York city today by the local Kiwanis club.

The club failed to mention, however, that many southwestern Alaskan cities, such as Sitka which is chuck full of totem poles, have been suffering from an acute water shortage because of lack of rain and cold weather.

Don Lane To Preside At Portland Meetings

Don Lane, manager of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, will leave tomorrow for Portland where he will preside at a joint meeting of Oregon chamber executives and Washington chamber managers and presidents, and sessions of the board of governors of the Western Institute for Commercial and Trade Association Executives. Lane is president of both Oregon chamber executives and the board of governors of the institute.

The Portland meetings are scheduled for February 5, 6, 7 and 8 and will include discussions and addresses on such topics as retail trade activities, fund raising, industrial relations, finance and membership, tourist promotion, and municipal business problems.

The western institute represents commercial and trade organizations from the 11 western states.

Movies Via Telephone Expected In Future

Duluth, Minn., Feb. 2.—(U.P.)—Television owners someday will be able to pick up a telephone, ask the operator for a specific channel and "see the finest movies Hollywood can produce," a motion picture producer and writer predicted.

Radio's 'Doctor Kate' Dies In Palo Alto

Palo Alto, Cal., Feb. 2.—(U.P.)—Mrs. Cornelia Glass Burdick, the former "Doctor Kate" of the radio, died at Palo Alto hospital yesterday after a brief illness. She was 53.

Mrs. Burdick was the wife of Harold L. (Hal) Burdick, star of the radio program, "Night Editor." He was author, producer and director of the "Doctor Kate" show when it was broadcast from 1936 to 1945.

In addition to her husband, Mrs. Burdick is survived by a son, Harold J., a student at Stanford university. She was a native of Oregon and graduated from University of Washington. For a time she worked on the Seattle Star and Seattle Post-Intelligencer.

BEEF POT ROAST with Mission NOODLES

1 lb. beef round steak
2 cups flour
1 cup salt
Pepper as desired
1 lb. beef per roast

2 c. vegetable liquid and water
8 medium size whole carrots
4 small whole onions
4oz. Mission Egg Noodles
