New York, Feb. 2.—(U.P.)—The crippled old man looked as though he didn't have a dime. He sat slumped against a building, his one leg stretched out before him, a crumpled felt hat at his side with a few yellow pencils in it.

"Thank you," he said politely when sympathetic passersby tossed nickels, dimes and quarters to him.

The old man's name was Robert T. Ingles. He was 62. And he wasn't as poor as he looked.

Nationwide Business

Hong Kong, Feb. 2.—(U.P.)—Port health authorities have imposed quarantine restrictions against arrivals from Formosa because of smallpox on the nationalist island, it was announced today.

California Doctor Service Offers Insurance Plan

San Francisco, Feb. 2.—(U.P.)—The California Physicians' Service has set up a catastrophe health insurance plan to cover 23 long-term illnesses.

The plan was announced yesterday by the CPS, the official health insurance organization of the California Medical Association. CPS is the country's second largest health insurance group.

With Health Plan

The plan will be offered only in northern California for the time being. It will be available only in conjunction with basic health plans now offered by the service.

It provides medical and surgical benefits of up to two years' care or \$5,000 for each of 23 ailments, including cancer, polio, tuberculosis, diabetes and severe burns or fractures.

70c Monthly Cost For Men

It will cost 70 cents a month for men and 95 cents for women on top of basic contract fees now in effect. These fees run as high as \$3.15 a month for men and \$3.90 for women. Family contracts are lower.

The plan apparently was designed to head off criticism that many voluntary health plans do not provide for long term illnesses or major diseases that hospitalize patients over long periods.

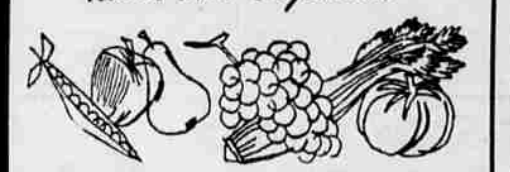
