Adventist Church Annual Meet Hears 1949 Work Reports

The Seventh-Day Adventist church had its annual business meeting recently. Membership report was submitted by Mrs. Pearl Ejarli. Mrs. Ebelene Beltz, leader of the Dorcas society, reported on the welfare work of this organization while Miss Myrtle Childs reported on the general missionary activities of the church for the past year. It was stated that 1,515 missionary contacts had been made and that 1,866 articles of clothing had been given away to needy individuals. Food baskets given away numbered 276 and 524 persons had been helped. The Dorcas society reported sending 26 boxes of clothing overseas. G. J. Lang, church treasurer, read the financial report, giving the amounts raised toward local church expenses and improvements and what had been given toward denominational projects. The local congregation in contributing toward the mission fund gave \$4,628.53 through the Sabbath school, the famine relief offering was \$790.18 and the week of sacrifice offering was \$401.18. The ingathering added \$2,960.33. The local church also contributed \$78.60 to a project of a medical school. A real interest was shown in the temperance work and the church has ordered 218 annual subscriptions to the new temperance and health magazine known as "Listen." These magazines are to be placed in the offices and waiting rooms of Medford.

Ashland, Feb. 3—Dr. Frank Munk, professor of political science at Reed college, Portland, will speak at an assembly at Southern Oregon college next Wednesday, it was announced by the college today. Dr. Munk, a native of Czechoslovakia, is an acknowledged authority on central European conditions, particularly with regard to relations with Russia. He has toured Europe frequently, his last trip being last summer, studying postwar conditions, and has acted in an advisory capacity to the state department.
