Alaska, Japan Heads Ask For Priority

Tokyo, Japan, Feb. 3 — (U.P.) — Reliable sources said today that American commanders in Alaska and Japan have asked the joint U. S. chiefs of staff to grant them priority for men and equipment.

At the same time the chief of U. S. naval operations, Admiral Forrest P. Sherman, said the U. S. far east fleet would be strengthened with the addition of six more destroyers.

Sherman and the other joint chiefs — Gen. Omar Bradley, Gen. J. Lawton Collins and Gen. Hoyt Vandenberg — now have ended their high-level conference with Gen. Douglas MacArthur and flown to Tokyo, northern Japan.

Bradley and Collins held a final conference with MacArthur and his top officials and then flew north with Sherman, Eighth Army Commander Lt. Gen. Walton Walker and First Corps Commander Maj. Gen. John Coulter.

Vandenberg, who has been inspecting U. S. air bases around Tokyo, flew to Kyoto alone.

Budworm Study To Aid In Fight Against Pests

Salem, Feb. 3—Oregon state forestry department shortly after February 15 will start advanced studies to determine the intensity of the spruce budworm infestation in Oregon and what can be expected during the spring outbreak, according to Alvin Lindsten, entomologist with the department's research division.

Lindsten will be assisted by W. J. Buckhorn, Portland, of the bureau of entomology and plant quarantine.

Infested branch specimens will be placed in rearing cages and the insects counted as they emerge. Buckhorn will collect specimens in the Blue mountains and Mt. Hood area and Lindsten in the Sisters region and in western Oregon.

Can Make Plans
Lindsten said that knowledge of the life habits of the pest will enable the department to make advance plans accordingly. The budworm hatches in July and the small caterpillar immediately hibernates in the bark of the branches.

Within a few days after twig specimens are placed in the cages, the young caterpillars will come out and can be counted.

The entomologist said that success of the spring control project, which will cover one million acres of Oregon forests, hinges on congressional appropriation of the \$800,000 federal share of the project. Early action is necessary, Lindsten said, since control work must start in June and time is needed to get the DDT mixture ready and arrangements for air-strips and 70 planes made.

State and private lands have guaranteed their shares of the cost.
