Lyons Family Home  
Burned To Ground

Wind-fanned flames Friday burned to the ground the two-story residence of Mrs. Emily A. Lyons and family at 621 Alberts street, a short distance outside the southwest city limits.

Medford firemen, dispatched to the scene when they were informed that homes inside the city limits were threatened, stated that only a few household items and clothing were saved. The loss was partially covered by insurance.

Ed Canoose, assistant fire chief, said that the cause of the fire was undetermined. He said he was told that Mrs. Lyons first noticed the blaze between the wall and the ceiling next to the fire and that it apparently began in the attic.

## Eight Calls Received

Mrs. Lyons and three children who occupied the house are reportedly staying at the homes of her other children.

Under strict orders of the city council against answering calls outside the city limits, firemen received eight alarm bells and three office phone calls before going to the blaze. At 3:57 p. m., 20 minutes after the first alarm, the department was informed that a house at 524 Park Place No. 5 was ablaze.

Two trucks went out but found no fire at the address. One truck stayed out and 1,200 feet of hose was laid for the Alberts street fire.
