BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA

SCOUTS MARK ANNIVERSARY—Troops, Cub packs and Explorer posts throughout the United States this week will commemorate the 40th anniversary of the Boy Scouts of America as they also observe Boy Scout week. The scout movement was incorporated at Washington, D. C., on February 8, 1910. "Strengthen Liberty" is the birthday theme. More than 2,300,000 boys and adult leaders are associated with the organization. Since 1910 more than 16,500,000 boys and men have been identified with the Boy Scouts of America.

Boy Scout Week To Feature Activities

Three major events and a number of additional activities in Big Pine district of the Crater Lake Area council will feature local observance of Boy Scout week, February 6 to 12 and of the 40th anniversary of the Boy Scouts of America.

A "crusade night" in the form of a district court of honor at 7:30 p. m. Tuesday, February 7 at the junior high school girls' gymnasium will be the first major activity. It will be held for all ranks and merit badge awards with scouts from the entire district participating.

To Take Over City
On Saturday, February 11, scouts will take over the city government. On Saturday, February 12, they will attend churches in groups in emphasis of Boy Scout Sunday, according to J. A. McDougall, council commissioner.

McDougall will direct the court of honor and Larry N. Schade, commissioner, and John Eddy, assistant district commissioner, are assisting with arrangements.

At the Tuesday program a mayor will be elected for the Saturday event. His identity will be revealed later in the week. One boy from each troop whose rank is first class or above will be nominated for mayor. Nominees other than the one chosen for the office will fill other city posts. In addition two youths from each troop are being nominated for the fire department and two for the police department.

Jimmy Dunlevy, district chairman, and John Danforth, commissioner, have charge of city government arrangements which are being completed with Mayor Diamond Flynn.

Will Attend Church
On Scout Sunday troops sponsored by churches will attend services of those churches. Other troops will pick churches to attend.
